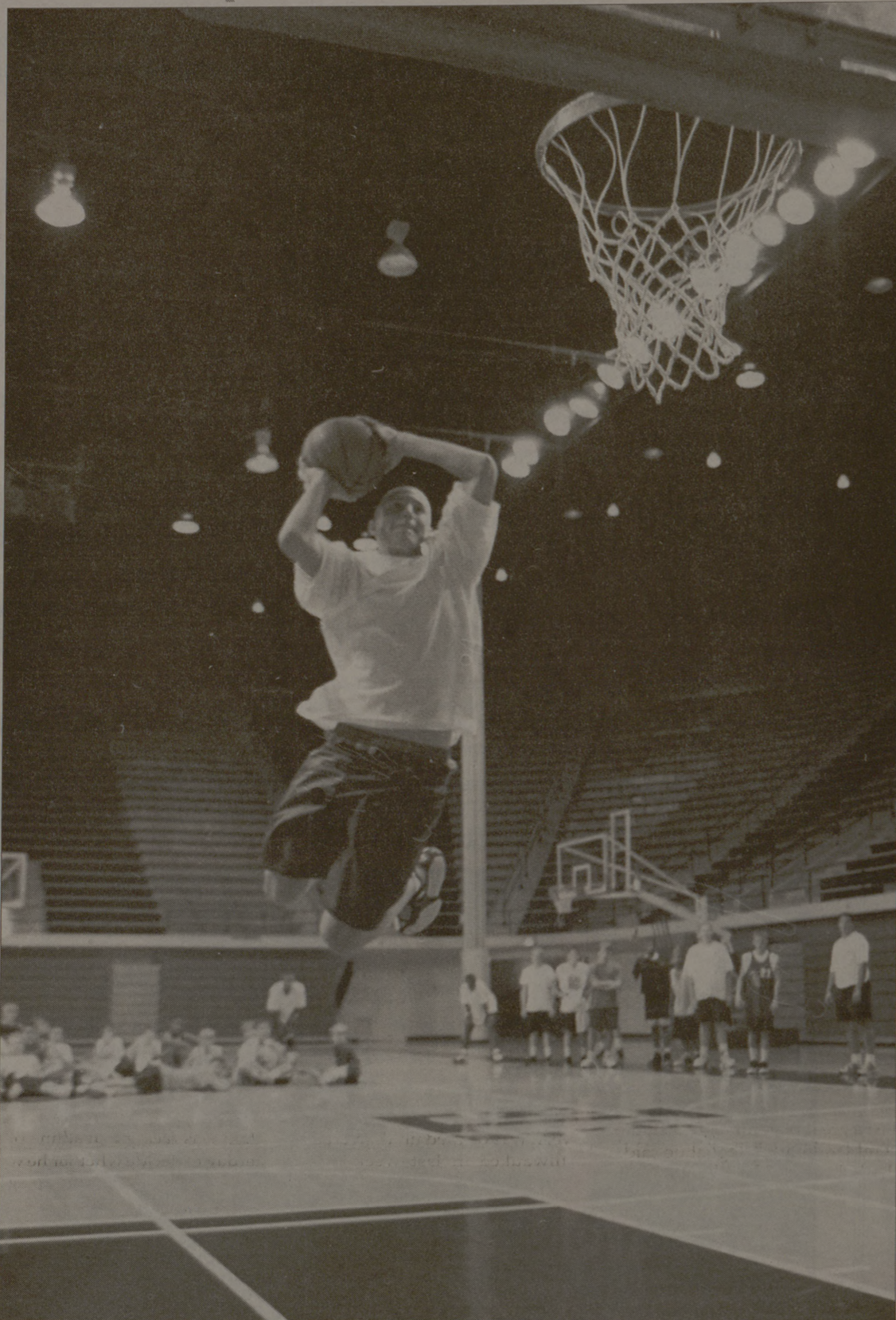


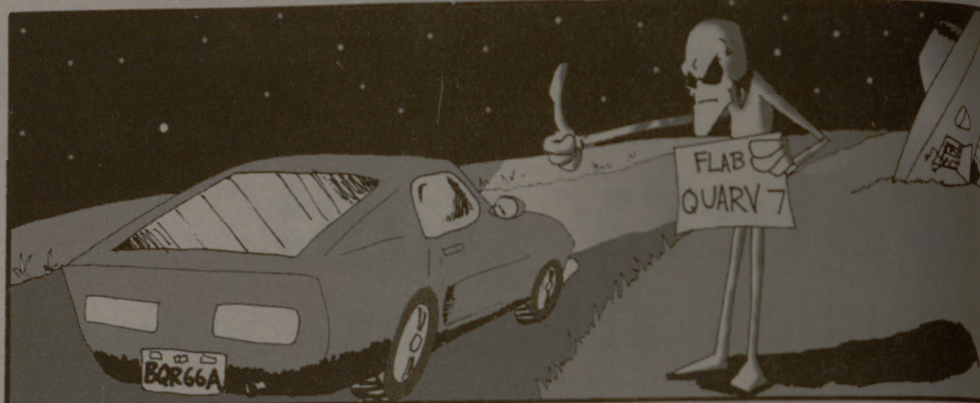

Still, very few people realized what the deteriorating remains were.

Arnold said the team will not try to raise the ship. Instead, they will excavate the remains and map out the ship.

"Whatever we learn about how the ship was built and about the machinery and supplies she carried, and what kind of cargo she had is important for Texas' heritage," he said.

Governor Bush acted wrongly, Mauro

AUSTIN (AP) — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Garry Mauro says Gov. George W. Bush was wrong to commute the death sentence of Henry Lee Lucas.

Bush commuted the sentence to life in prison on the recommendation of the Board of Pardons and Paroles. Lucas had been convicted in the slaying of an unidentified woman known as "Orange Socks" after the only clothing found on her body.

Lucas recanted his confession, which was the only evidence that linked him to the woman's murder, Bush said.

The Republican governor said jurors who heard the case "could not have known that Henry Lee Lucas had a pattern of lying and confessing to crimes that evidence later provid-

ed he did not commit.

Mauro, in an interview with Austin American-Statesman, said he did not know whether Lucas commuted by William County judge. However, Mauro said he has no doubt in his mind that Lucas is guilty of enough crimes to merit the death penalty.

Asked whether the death penalty should be based on what a person has done in other cases, Mauro said, "That's what I said."

Bush campaign spokeswoman Mindy Tucker said, "Although Lee Lucas is unquestionably a despicable criminal, his disregard for the law and of this case is alarming."
