As one of the few non-electronica groups to come out of the UK in the past few years, Gomez combines influences ranging from the Grateful Dead to the Beatles, laying down track after track of music that is as engaging as it is experimental.

"78 Stone Wobble", the album's first single, gives a nod to Rubber Soul (they are British, after all) while songs like "Whippin' Piccadilly" and "Get Myself Arrested" show obvious ties to good old Americana. Play on Gomez, and show Britain the light.

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
