 "We don't want to do away with [the traditions] but re-evaluate alcohol's part in them." Thursday in the MSC there will be a resource table set up with "mocktails," nonalcoholic beverages designed to be alternatives to alcohol, for students to sample and a board that lists "100 fun things to do without alcohol." Breault said that students can add their suggestions to the board. "One of the things we hope to promote is that there are so many alternative things you can do without [drinking] alcohol,"

she said. Friday marks the celebration of the week with an Aggie, a dunk tank in the Rudder Forum. Prominent campus groups such as yell leaders and A&M head football R.C. Slocum will participate. Money raised will go to the Bonfire Alcohol Business Committee. Breault said she hopes the week will promote responsible alcohol decision-making. "I think one of the things this office tries to promote is our slogan, 'No alcohol shatter the traditions,'" she said. "We want to keep the traditions, but keep them healthy."
