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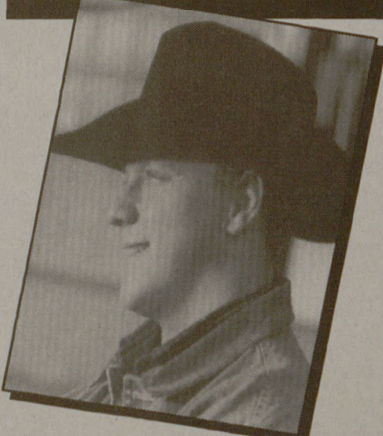
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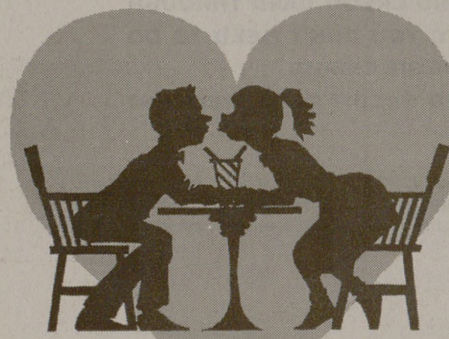
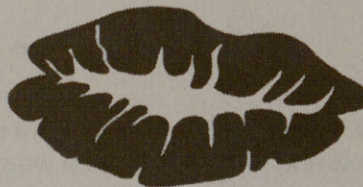
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PUCKER UP!

**Forum to focus on
relationship skills**

A&M students will present a series of skits pertaining to communication in relationships and sexual situations at 7 p.m. in Rudder 510.

"Communication & Relationships" is sponsored by Student Health Services, Health Education and Aggie Representatives Educating About College Health (REACH) as a part of Sexual Responsibility Week.

Dr. Alicia Marshall of the Department of Speech Communications and Margaret Griffith, health education coordinator for Student Health Services, are creators and participants of the event. The program will feature students acting out scenarios concerning sexual issues relevant to students and relationships. There will be four skits, each about a different issue.

Marshall said the event will not be a lecture but a light-hearted, student-based presentation.

"Our take-home message is for everyone to respect, lis-

ten to and communicate with their partner," she said. "One cannot be sexually responsible without communicating with their intimate partner."

Audience members will have an opportunity to participate in the presentation.

Griffith said the audience is an important aspect of the performance because they will be asked to comment on the skits.

"We will discuss [with the audience] what happens in a sequence, how they felt about it and how they should react," she said.

Courtney Liebrum, a senior speech communication major, said she will participate in a skit promoting the virtue of self respect. Liebrum said the skits will have scenarios of role reversal, so the opposite sex will be able to see how the other feels in different situations.

"What we want to accomplish is to have students want to take responsibility for their own actions, sexuality and well being," she said.

**Prof to speak

Dr. Scott Poole, professor in the Department of Speech Communication, said Keyton has conducted research in the areas of sexual harassment and the creation of sexual ha-
