

AUSTIN (AP) — A Dallas businessman pledged a \$3 million donation to University of Texas athletics at the time his company was seeking a 15-year contract to operate a private club in the school's football stadium, the Austin American-Statesman reported Wednes-

UT officials said there were no ethical lapses with the gift or contract, which went to Robert Dedman Sr.'s Club Corporation of America (CCA). That the two occurred simultaneously was coinci-


