"If students pay for some students will pay others will pay \$50. Either way, the fee is the 'no duplicate' printer labs."

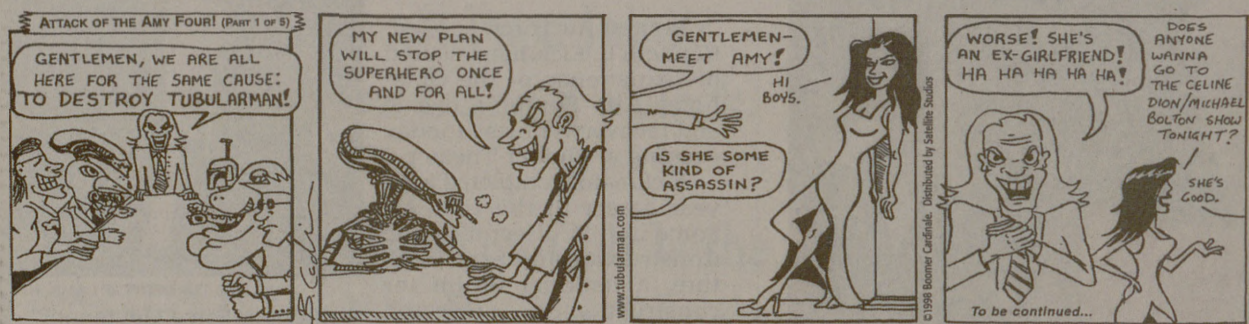
Student Body President Nickel said she wants to put on the fee increase. "I have very interesting all letters back to the union," she said.

## Brady to speak on U.S. relations

Rep. Kevin Brady will speak to the Jewish Student Association, other students, faculty, staff and community members about United States-Israel relations at a dinner tonight from 5 to 6 p.m. at the Hillel Jewish Student Center on University Drive.

Aaron Horvitz, coordinator of the dinner and a senior political science major, said he met Brady at a College Republicans meeting. He and Rabbi Peter Tarlow, rabbi for the Jewish Student Association, contacted Brady's office and invited him to speak to the group.

Horvitz said Brady is a valuable person to speak about U.S. policy in the Middle East because he serves on the International Relations Committee, which provides foreign aid to Israel. He said the event is a good way for Brady to meet some of his constituents.

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**Undergraduate Student Requirements:**

1. You must be a degree seeking student and have a total of **95 undergraduate credit** hours reflected on the Texas A&M University Student Information Management System. (A passed course, which is repeated and passed, cannot count as additional credit hours.)
2. **60** undergraduate credit hours must have been completed in residence at Texas A&M University if your first semester at Texas A&M University was January 1994 or thereafter, or if you do not qualify under the successful semester requirement described in the following paragraph. Should your degree be conferred with less than 60 undergraduate resident credits, this requirement will be waived after you graduate and your degree is posted on the Student Information Management System.
3. 30 undergraduate credit hours must have been completed in residence at Texas A&M University, providing that prior to January 1, 1994, you were registered at Texas A&M University and successfully completed either a fall/spring semester or summer term (I and II or 10 weeks) as a full-time student in good standing (as defined in the University catalog).
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If you are a May 1999 degree candidate and you do not have an Aggie ring from a prior degree, you may place an order after you meet the following requirements:

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However, if you have completed all of your course work prior to this semester and have been cleared by the thesis clerk, you may request a "letter of completion" from the Office of Graduate Studies (providing it is not past the deadline). The original letter of completion, with the seal, may be presented to the Ring Office in lieu of your degree being posted.

**Procedure To Order A Ring:**

1. If you meet all of the above requirements and wish to receive your ring on April 15, 1999, you must visit the Ring Office **no later than Wednesday, February 17, 1999**, between the hours of 8:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. to complete the application for eligibility verification.
2. Return no later than February 19, 1999 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. to check on the status of your audit and if qualified, pay in full by cash, check, money order, or your personal Discover, Visa or MasterCard (with your name imprinted).
