

From student leader to regent, McClure receives accolades

n 1994, Frederick D. McClure was named one of America's 50 most promising leaders, age 40 and under, by Time magazine. Although an unfamiliar name to most Texas A&M students, Board of Regents member Fred McClure has been continually striving towards improving the A&M system.

McClure received his bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics from A&M in 1976. Although A&M was not his first choice, McClure said deciding to go to A&M was one of the best decisions he ever

"Up until and including my senior year in high school, I was going to go to the University of Texas," Mc-Clure said. "I wanted to be a doctor. In the spring of my senior year, I won a scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and it required me to go somewhere where I could major in agriculture.
"I figured, 'I'll go to A&M,' which
