Howdy Ags

Organization devotes week toward keeping A&M's friendliest tradition, campus unity

Floating boats in Rudder Fountain, handing out stickers and teaming up in T-shirts bearing letters of the word "Howdy" are methods Howdy Ags has chosen to promote Texas A&M's traditional greeting this week.

Amber Fairchild, president of Howdy Ags and a junior civil engineering major, said the organization assumed control of the project from the Traditions Council last year so the week could receive full attention from its sponsor. She said it is the organization's only major event, while the Traditions Council has other responsibilities.

"We're just trying to keep A&M the friendliest campus," she said. "We think Howdy is the root of all the

traditions. I think a lot of people come here their senior year in high school and someone says "Howdy" to them, and they are taken aback."

Fairchild said Howdy Week promotional activities are executed by volunteers and organization members recruited at the Spring and Fall MSC Open Houses. She said there are more than 100 volunteers this semester.

Scott Maxey, a volunteer and a freshman chemical engineering major, said students interested in participating apply at Open House.

Maxey, a member of the T-shirted team that parades throughout campus greeting people and encouraging responses, said when Howdy Week approaches, the volunteers sign up for activities and shifts. Maxey said the Howdy tradition is important for

campus unity.

"Howdy is a way to get people," he said. "It makes like a family."

Fairchild said Howdy is more heavily during the Howdy Week each year because organization members are acquainted in the Fall. Many other reasons the spring promotion is bigger is because there are more it-promoting events during so it is not needed as much.

Fairchild said promotional activities for the week will include distribution of stickers, fortune cookies, buttons and stress balls, balloons, buttons and stress balls, Rudder Tower, the Webster and the Zachry Building. She said the organization will sell T-shirts, hold boat races in Rudder to build spirit.

tions specialist for the College of Architecture, said the award is significant because it considers all students who have worked on any sort of international project.

The project that won last year's award involved building a school and renovating existing educational facilities in a small town in Thailand.
