"Dos Caras is a collection of unique sculptures, llages and mixed media incorporating both culs," Mlodnicka said. "Much of the artwork has onscurring themes and symbols such as shovels, akes eating their own tails and different [Roman]

tholic icons. Trejo said his art includes many variations due to research into different religions and cultures. "I use my research to add to my interpretation of

The exhibit is divided into four groups. The first is the "Night Mask" series which consists of wall assemblages incorporating painted wooden panels with define objects fixed on them.

"The Fly in the Milk" is the second series including wall assemblages resembling puppets or skele-

Next are wall-mounted aluminum constructions, and the fourth group includes Trejo's most recognized drawings and collages.

"Dos Caras/Two Faces" is being displayed in con-

junction with the 12th Annual Southwest Student Conference on Latin Affairs presented by the MSC Committee for the Awareness of Mexican American Culture (CAMAC).

The exhibit was organized by the Gallery Program at Eastern University of Washing-

Laura Huerta, CA-MAC officer and a senior liberal arts major, said she is excited about the exhibit.

"During my four years here, this is the first time I have seen Latin artwork in the gallery," Huerta said. 'It is great to have in conjunction with the conference.

Mlodnicka said she is also enthused about the exhibit and is

proud of the crowds it has attracted. "A lot of people have come through to view the art," she said. "The exhibit is very popular and stu-

dents are enjoying the presentation of 'Two Faces.' "Dos Caras/Two Faces" is on display in the MSC Visual Arts Gallery, located on the second floor of
