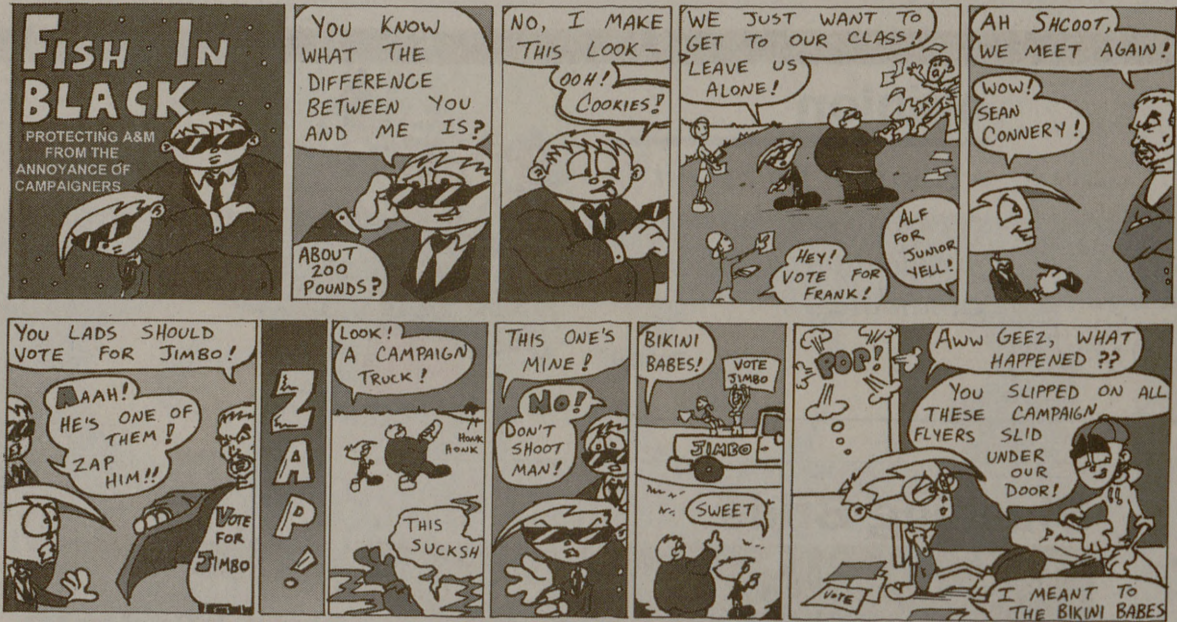

funds from student's scholarships generated by licensing revenue to the Athletic Department.

"As an Aggie and as a former A&M licensee of 10 years, I do not agree with the President's decision because it is not Athletics, but overall school loyalty, which fuels the sales of licensed A&M merchandise," Brenckman said. "Regardless of whether the football team wins or loses, Aggies will buy A&M merchandise."

Groff said they are seeking bids for someone to manage the licensing program.

Floyd said even though funds are sometimes transferred, it does not mean other student activities are receiving less funding.

"Many times, it is due to the fact that student activities are receiving funds from other sources, such as the Coke machines or AT&T," he said.

Brenckman claims Bowen met with representatives from Licensing Resource Group to formalize a contract which out-sources almost all functions previously performed by the University's licensing staff and planned to redirect licensing revenue to Athletics in December of 1998 without consulting the Texas A&M Board of Regents.

"It is up to the President's discretion as to how to allocate funds," Floyd said.

Brenckman said that according to an official at A&M Honors Program, funding budgeted from licensing for freshman and sophomore scholarships awarded to students in 1995 was rescinded by Bowen when he transferred nearly \$1 million dollars from licensing to Athletics. Bowen was unavailable for comment.

Music festival to host 90 bands in Northgate

The second North by Northgate music festival will showcase more than 90 bands this weekend at various establishments throughout the Northgate area including Shadow Canyon, The Cow Hop and Fitzwilly's Bar and Grill.

Jaime Thomas, event coordinator, said she is expecting a larger crowd than last year's event attracted.

"Last year, at least 5,000 people attended the music festival over the two-day period," Thomas said. "This year we have had pre-sale passes available at reduced prices, which we hope will increase overall ticket sales."

Thomas said the festival is better known this year due to increased publicity. She said coordinators increased advertising and publicized more about the bands performing.

Thomas said most of the bands are different from those that have performed in previous years. She said last year's most popular show

was Chris Duarte, and the Pushmonkey to be the favorite.

Thomas said Valley of the Sun, who just signed a new label, will also perform.

"Vallejo was very popular at South by Southwest and Friday," Thomas said. "Bliss has just signed with a new label and they are playing at the Pushmonkey on Friday at Shadow Canyon."

Thomas said there are a lot of additions to the festival this year she hopes will add to the festival.

"This year there will be a jockey at Disc-Go-Round on Friday night," Thomas said. "There will also be a listening booth for the Northgate area before and during the festival."

Thomas said an addition to the festival will be a meet-and-greet session with the bands playing at the festival. She said this will be outside The Cow Hop and will be on Friday and Saturday nights at the pavilion in the Northgate area before and during the festival.

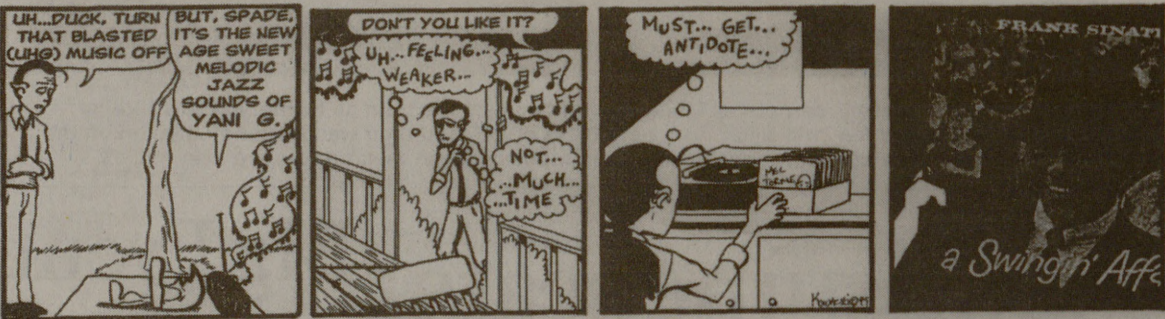
