



The increasing need for information about women's health has resulted in the publication of the book Contemporary Women's Health by Dr. Danny Ballard, professor of health in the Department of Health and Kinesiology; Dr. Cheryl Kolander, professor of health at the University of Louisville; and Dr. Cindy Chandler, professor of counseling psychology at the University of

Ballard said the book addresses rape and crisis awareness, substance-abuse awareness, consumer health issues and reproduction information. The book contains journal pages at the end of each chapter for readers to

record reactions and personal health-status assessments. 'We decided we wanted women to examine their experiences and to record how they felt," Ballard said in a press release. "The best way to do that was to include the 'Journal Activity' segment so women could record their own emotions about that topic or chapter.






