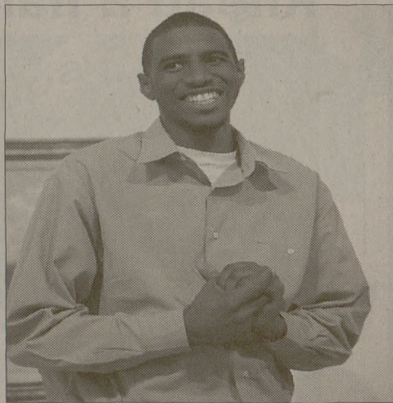

Search for spacecraft to be documented

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — An underwater salvage expert who has spent 14 years trying to find Gus Grissom's sunken Mercury capsule heads out to sea this weekend in his most extensive search for the spacecraft yet.

Curt Newport is teaming up with the Discovery Channel for the two-week hunt in 3-mile-deep water about 300 miles offshore.

The crew plans to set sail Sunday with the latest in side-scan sonar in hopes of finding Liberty Bell 7, lost at sea 38 years ago.

"We have a pretty good idea where to look for it," Newport said Wednesday. "To say I'm cautiously optimistic is probably the right term."

Liberty Bell 7 sank to the bottom of the Atlantic after splashing down with the Mercury astronaut on July 21, 1961. The explosive bolts that blow open the hatch detonated prematurely. To this day, there is debate over whether the hatch malfunctioned or Grissom panicked and blew

it open.

The capsule is the only U.S. manned spacecraft lost after a successful mission.

Discovery Channel is paying for the expedition as well as filming it for a documentary to be broadcast this fall.

"The story of the Liberty Bell 7 is a fascinating one that, to my knowledge, really hasn't been told except for a segment in *The Right Stuff*," said Karen Baratz, a Discovery Chan-

nel spokesperson. Grissom, who nearly drowned, insisted until his death in a 1967 Apollo launch pad fire that he did nothing to cause the hatch to blow. NASA exonerated Grissom after the Mercury accident and he went on to fly on Gemini 3, although some accounts, including Tom Wolfe's 1979 book *The Right Stuff*, suggested Grissom panicked.

"One of the greatest mysteries in the history of American spaceflight is locked onto that hatch door and that is, 'Did Gus blow the hatch or was it a mechanical malfunction?'" said Max Ary, president of the Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center, which will restore the capsule if it's found. "It could be answered if we're able to recover the hatch."

Newport, 47, a former space station worker who left Oceanering International in January to found his own company, Liberty Bell 7 Inc., said: "Outside of Challenger, this is the only one we haven't gotten back. It's the right thing to do. It's patriotic. It was one of ours."

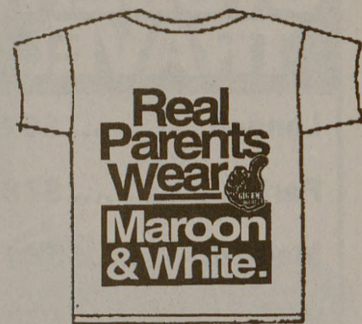

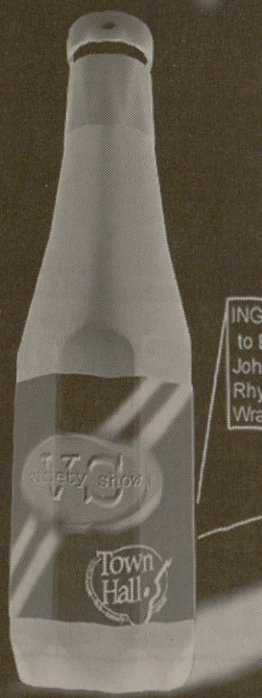
