¬ arth Day has been celebrated for almost 30 years, with communities all over the United States getting involved.

Earth Day was first started by Dennis Hayes in

April 22 was chosen as Earth Day by the Environmental Protection Agency.

'[It] was a random day," Krause said. "In Texas, it happens to correspond with Arbor Day, which is also in the end of April. This day is for people to be more aware of trees.
