Length between Park Place, Southwest Parkway undergoes resurfacing; completion scheduled for Aug.

After the resurfacing, the street will be widened

Frank Simoneaux, graduate engineer with the City of College Station, said the construction is an effort to create a smoother and stabler driving surface.

He said workers with Young Bros. Contractors, Inc. are removing six inches of pavement and applying new base material and asphalt.

"We ask that people be careful in the work zone where the lanes are narrow," he said. "The number of lanes is reduced because we are moving traffic onto half of the road while base material is applied to the other half. Then we will move traffic again while the other side is

Ashley Wray, a resident of College Station who lives off Anderson street, said the street is rough and in need of resurfacing.

It is a good time for the work to be done with summer approaching," she said. "But I wish someone had told the residents what was going on first, because it is a big inconve-

Simoneaux said reducing the number of lanes is an inconvenience, but it is the only way to keep the traffic on Anderson Street while the work is being done.

He said the expected completion date for resurfacing Anderson is Aug. 17, and work to widen the street will begin in the summer.

The street will be widened from its intersection with Park Place to its intersection with George Bush so that a left turn lane can be
