## State legislators head home

### Bush's presidential plans, big money mark 1999 session

AUSTIN (AP) — In their 140-day Capitol stay, state legislators spent a record amount, cut taxes and watched with fellow Texans as Gov. George W. Bush emerged as a force to be reckoned with in presidential politics.

The Republican governor started 1999 by inviting lawmakers to share in his national spotlight. He ended it as the opinion poll front-runner with campaign trips to Iowa and New Hampshire beginning June 12.

"I know there was a lot of speculation, particularly because of me," Bush said. "But by and large, the members (of the Legislature) didn't let that affect their decisions."

In a slap at the partisan-gridlocked Congress, Bush said Texas showed the nation how lawmaking should be handled.

"People from both parties came together for a brief period of time and enacted a lot of law that will make Texas a better place," he said. "I think people, when they take an objective look, will say this has been a good session."

On the big money issues, lawmakers took a \$6.4 billion surplus, cut \$1.85 billion in taxes and spent a record \$98.1 billion — more than \$9 billion higher than the current budget.

They cut property taxes by taxpayers down the road. Peggy Venable, director of Texas Citizens for a Strong Economy, said.

"It commits us to these new programs and big salaries, yet when the economy slows down and we have budget surplus, taxpayers get hit with a tax increase."


This was only the second session in the 20th century where Republicans controlled one of the Legislature's two houses.

But the GOP's one-Senate majority was enhanced by the century's Republican lieutenant governor, Rick Perry. In the 150th House, Democratic control was trimmed to 78-72.

Leaders insisted partisanship played no role.

"I think people kept partisanship checked at the door. There's a lot of credit belongs in this (Capitol) building — to people like Democrats and Republican Bush said.

"You can't do it by yourself," Perry said. "There's a lot of teamwork around here."

## More repairs made to space station

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Working fast, astronauts fixed a broken radio, replaced flawed battery packs and installed foam mufflers over noisy fans Monday aboard the new international space station.

They launched into the repairs within minutes of entering the 77-foot orbiting complex late Sunday. Several hours later, much of the work was done.

"It literally was open the hatch and run in there and get to work," flight director Paul Hill said, marveling at the crew's speed and precision.

Two of space shuttle *Discovery's* seven astronauts immediately went to work on the radio system inside the American-made *Unity* module, replacing two electronic boxes. The new pack allowed NASA to once again monitor all systems aboard *Unity*.

The radio link from *Unity* was lost in April, four months after the module was hoisted into orbit.

At the same time, Russian Valery Tokarev and Canadian Julie Payette pulled up the floor inside the Russian-built *Zarya* control module to install batteries that had not been charging right for months.

## Turbulence rocks landing jetliner at DFW Airport

GRAPEVINE (AP) — Two flight attendants were injured Monday when an American Airlines flight hit turbulence as it approached Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

None of the 72 passengers aboard Flight 2006 were injured, airline spokesperson Mark Slitt said.

The MD-80 flight originated in Seattle and landed at DFW shortly before noon.

Thunderstorms were moving through the area when the plane, at 12,000 feet, hit turbulence about 30 miles from the airport.

Slitt said the injuries appear minor. One flight attendant scraped her knee and required no medical care.

Another bumped her head twice and went to Baylor Medical Center in Grapevine for examination.

band's research has focused on the effect of violent language and behavior.

"We've always had violence," Mrs. Conoley said, "We need to find real solutions for the community."

Mr. Conoley said implementing more programs will not help the community but instead allow people to place the blame and responsibility on others.

Tommy Ramirez, special programs manager for the Brazos County Juvenile Department, said he has worked with developing programs for high-risk youths.

He said it is possible that programs can be founded through this forum to allow people to become more involved and responsible.

"In the end, it is possible that everyone can come together for the kids in the community," Ramirez said.
