PLANO (AP) — A suspect wanted for questioning in two Missouri murders and numerous robberies was shot and killed by police vesterday in a busy suburban Dallas

shopping center. Plano police spokesperson Carl Duke said the man, whose name was not immediately released, was wanted in Clay and Jackson counties in Missouri. Duke did not have details on those cases

However, a Kansas City, Mo., television station reported the suspect was wanted for the murder of 18-year-old woman, Christy Schroeder.

In a 2-1 vote, announced by the Justice Department yesterday, arbitrators set the amount after lawyers for the government and Zapruder family could not agree on a price.

The government offered \$1 million; the family asked \$30 mil-
