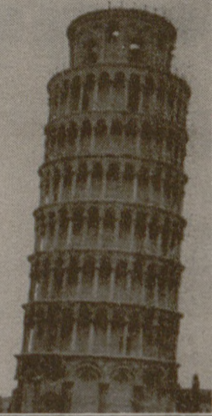

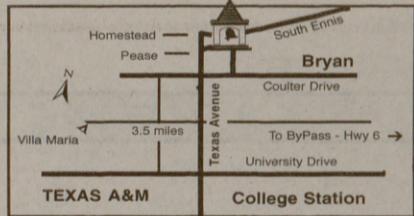

Clinton trip nears end Fund-raisers, house shopping dominate vacation

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — A summer vacation that put President Clinton's lame-duck status on uncomfortable display neared a close yesterday with a pair of fund-raisers for the family's newly minted politician — the president's wife.

The Clintons also waited to find out whether their offer to purchase a new home in a New York City suburb was accepted.

While Clinton golfed, lounged and gave a handful of political speeches, much of the 16-day trip to Massachusetts and New York focused on Hillary Rodham Clinton and her presumed run for the Sen-

ate next year. Over the course of the trip, Mrs. Clinton expected to raise about \$800,000 for her exploratory campaign committee.

If she runs, Mrs. Clinton must live in New York by Election Day. If the Clintons have their way, home will be a Georgian colonial they toured last weekend in Westchester County.

Sources familiar with the Clintons' housing search said they made a bid on the house and were waiting to see if it is accepted. The Clintons offered less than the asking price of nearly \$1.7 million, but the sources would not detail the negotiations.

The 110-year-old house sits on a little more than an acre of parklike grounds, is located near a golf course and boasts a swimming pool, lush landscaping and an exercise room on the top floor.

The house apparently passed security muster this week. The Secret Service checked out the house with an eye to protecting Clinton when he is a private citizen. Former presidents have a small security detail.

Clinton has 17 months left in his second term and is thinking about his future.

"I can work for cheap," he told a New Yorker this week. "I've got a good pension." At another point he noted, "I'm looking for a new role."

The Clintons spent more than half of the vacation in New York, forsaking a second week on the Massachusetts resort island of Martha's Vineyard where they have been summer regulars during Clinton's more than six years in office. They will head to Camp David, the presidential retreat in Maryland, today.

Bush offers school plan

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Republican presidential candidate George W. Bush said yesterday federal funds should be allocated from the worst-performing schools and made available to parents for private education or "whatever offers."

Under Bush's plan, school getting Title I money would be required to test incoming students on basic academic skills. A warning would be issued to schools that fail to progress toward state standards.

After three years of progress, the Title I schools would be matched with federal education money given to the state, which set up an education account about \$1,500 a year — for affected student.

Website halts online auction of kidney

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The bidding for a human kidney offered on the Internet auction site eBay hit \$5.7 million before the company put a stop to it yesterday.

Spokesperson for eBay Kevin Pursglove said he had no idea if the kidney offering was for real, but the auction was stopped because the seller broke eBay's rules outlawing the sale of body parts.

Selling one's own organs is also illegal under federal law. It is punishable by up to five years in prison or a \$50,000 fine.

"Any time you have an open trading environment with almost 6 million registered users, you're likely to see somebody who tries to bend the rules, or to pull a prank on their fellow users," Pursglove said.

The seller, identified as "hchero" from Sunrise, Fla., started the bidding at \$25,000 on Aug.

26. The description read: "Fully functional kidney for sale. You can choose either kidney. Buyer pays all transplant and medical costs."

"Of course only one for sale, as I need the other one to live. Serious bids only."

Dr. Thomas Reardon, president of the American Medical Association, said he was aback when he heard about the kidney sale.

"Wow. Well, first of all, I'd question the legality of any doctor who would participate in a transaction," Reardon said. "Second, it's illegal to sell organs in this country."

The Website has no system to spot questionable offers, instead relying on users to report them, Pursglove said.

"We get items we have to take down fairly frequent basis. From time to time, get a kidney or a liver," he said.

In April, a group of engineers tried to sell themselves as "high-priced, professionally trained cybergeeks" for \$3.14 million. The group stopped its own auction explanation, but not before receiving a number of bids.
