Gert strengthens in Atlantic

MIAMI (AP) — Foul weather building in the Gulf of Mexico yesterday threatened to form Tropical Storm Harvey.

Meanwhile, Hurricane Gert, with 130-mph winds, loomed a threat to Bermuda.

Forecasters at the National Hurricane Center expected to post a storm warning or watch for the northern and eastern Gulf Coast late yesterday with a tropical depression circulating off the Florida coast with 35-mph winds.

The system should come ashore north of Tampa, cross the Florida peninsula tomorrow and shoot into the Atlantic with 55 to 60-mph winds but will not pose much of a rain threat to flooded areas of the Carolinas, hurricane specialist Brian Jarvinen said.

The storm will "be moving fairly briskly, and they (the Carolinas) would be on the drier side of the system when it came by," he said. "I wouldn't be expecting a whole heck of a lot of rain from this system."

Though upper-level winds were chopping off the tops of storm clouds keep the system in check, it was likely to strengthen

into Harvey late Sunday or early Monday, forecasters said.

At 11 a.m. EDT, the system was centered about 335 miles southwest of St. Petersburg near 26.1 north latitude and 87.7 west longitude and moving north near 7 mph.

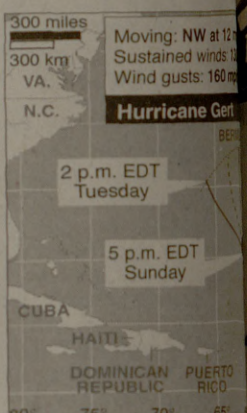
A trough over the continental United States is expected to slowly turn the system to the northeast, said Jarvinen.

"There's still some uncertainties about how strong it will be and when that turn will be," he said.

"We don't anticipate anything happening really fast so people have plenty of time to do what they need to do."

The outer reaches of the system dumped an inch of rain on South Florida Saturday and yesterday.

Meanwhile, people in Bermuda have been told to watch Hurri-

Hurricane Floyd hits North Carolina

GREENVILLE, N.C. (AP) — The power is intermittent, much of the county is completely under water, roads are closed, grocery store shelves are empty and there is little gasoline available. Can it get worse? Yes.

Greenville, a city of 44,000, faces still worse flooding when the Tar River crests today. And more rain could fall today and tomorrow.

"Everyone is figuring out their own survival," Carl Campbell said yesterday as the river inched closer to his home and neighbors tried to save their belongings from their flooded homes.

Hurricane Floyd saturated eastern North Carolina with 20 inches of rain last week on its way to the East Coast and flooding has virtually shut down the coastal plain east of Raleigh.

National Guard helicopters were used to rescue stranded people and to shuttle food to towns where grocery shelves are bare.

Drinkable water had to be rushed to several towns where wastewater treatment systems are down. About 300 roads, including parts of Interstate 85 and 40, were still closed yesterday, and 6,000 people remained in shelters.

At least 21 people are confirmed dead, including a Pinetops family lost when they tried to escape a flooded home in a boat early Thursday. One person was unaccounted for.

They are among the at least 47 people killed in the Bahamas into New England.

And beyond North Carolina, thousands of people were still without electricity and phone service in parts of Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York state.

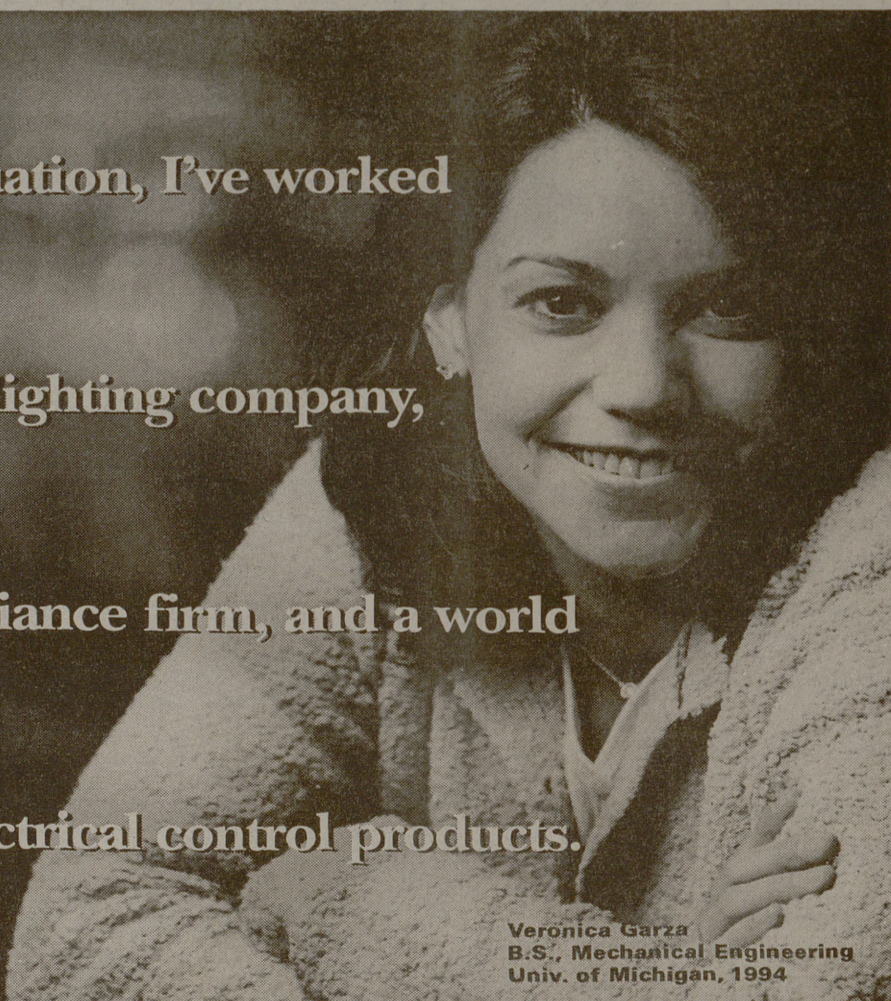
President Clinton had declared the eastern third of North Carolina a disaster area and authorized \$100 million to tour flooded areas today.

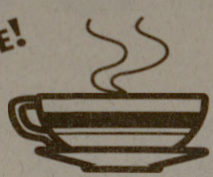

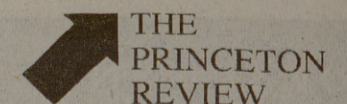
