Hickey led the 1993-1994 team to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament with a 23-8 over-all record and a second-place finish in the SWC. In 1994 when Hickey was promoted to senior associate athletic director and relinquished her coaching duties. She finished her coaching career at A&M with a 154-128 record in 10 seasons.

Cheātham said she is now one of only a few female athletic directors at the Division I level and at this level, Hickey will gain the background she needs to be more influential in the lobby for women's athletics.

She said Hickey will be missed by many in the A&M Athletics Department because she was well liked and got many people involved in the department.

"Lynn was a doer not a watcher, she got many people on board and involved in women's athletics," she said. "She was and is a great mentor, a great friend, and a wonderful person, we will miss her, but we will keep in touch.


