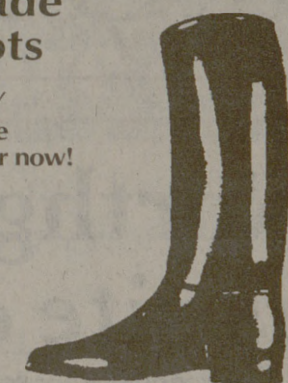

Jury to decide fate of accused officers

GALVESTON (AP) — Jurors today will decide the fate of three Brazoria County officers accused of mistreating an inmate during a videotaped jail shakedown three years ago.

Former K-9 deputy David Cisneros, former jailer Wilton David Wallace and jailer Robert Percival face up to 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine if convicted of violating the civil rights and causing bodily injury to Missouri inmate Toby Hawthorne.

The three men could get probation or up to a year in jail if convicted of lesser misdemeanor charges not alleging bodily injury. Former Lt. Lester Arnold, who used a stun gun on the inmates, pleaded guilty to this reduced charge last week to avoid trial.

Final testimony in the trial yesterday came from Cisneros, who said he did not intend for his police dog to attack any inmates. He also admitted his written report on the incident contained several inaccuracies.

Murdered girls' families react to suspects'

AUSTIN (AP) — Parents of the four girls killed in the city's notorious yogurt shop murders said yesterday they thought the case would remain unsolved.

"One day, whoever did it would probably have to answer for it, but we wouldn't know about it," Pam Ayers, whose 13-year-old daughter, Amy, was one of four teen-age girls shot in the head during a Dec. 6, 1991, robbery, said. "I don't think it will be real to me until we actually see the men and have an indictment in the case."

After chasing leads for eight years, police arrested four suspects Wednesday.

Police in Charleston, W.Va., arrested Robert Burns Springsteen Jr., 24, Michael James Scott, 25, of Buda, Texas, was arrested near Austin. Maurice Pierce, 24, was arrested in Lewisville, north of Dallas, and Forrest Wellborn, 23, was picked up in Lockhart, southeast of Austin.

All have been charged with capital murder in the deaths of Ayers; Eliza Hope Thomas, 17; and sisters

Jennifer Harbison, 17, and Sarah Harbison, 15.

Each girl was shot at the I Can't Believe It's Yogurt! store where Thomas and Jennifer Harbison worked. Afterward, the store was set on fire.

The victims' parents choked up a few times but shed no tears in a 20-minute meeting with reporters, where they discussed the arrests for the first time publicly.

They would not release any facts of the case. They said they were angry about reports that questioned one of the few days after the murders made no arrests.

"That's water under the bridge," Bob Ayers, Amy's father, said. "We'll just take what we can get right now and go forward."

"It's been gratifying to see the investigation has moved forward," Eliza's father, James Thomas, said.

Although they welcomed the arrests, they also were forced to relive the day their daughters were murdered.

"Now we have to look at one who actually pulled the trigger on our children," Ayres, mother of the victims, said. "The anxiety level is really high."

Ayres said she felt when she looked at the photographs of the suspects, "They are just people who don't know who they are."
