Warrick was a leading Heisman Trophy candidate until
his arrest on a felony grand theft charge. The wide receiver had
hoped to have his case reduced to misdemeanor in county court Warrick's lawyer, John Kenny,
asked for the postponement so he asked for the postponement so he
could speak with school officials. The agreement would require Warrick to spend 30 days in jail, donate to charity clothing he
acquired in three trips to a acquired in three trips to a
Dillard's store, pay $\$ 295$ in court costs, stay away from the depart-
ment store and serve a year's ment store and serve a year's

cycling's most prestigious race. He is the first cyclist to be selected for
