national security aim, he said. The troop deployment to secure supply lines and assure that food aid got to the famine stricken populace was prompted largely by television images of starving children, Bush said.

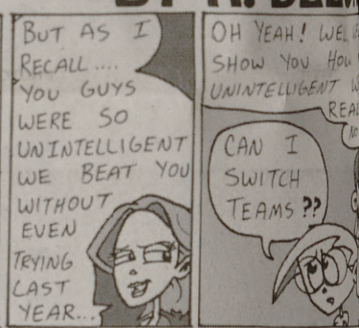
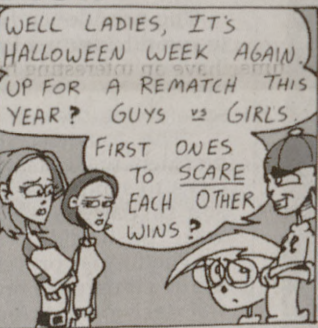
But he cautioned against using the military in every humanitarian crisis that tugs at Americans' heartstrings.

"We can't be the world's policeman, or use military force every time we see genocide or tragedy," he said. "The commander in chief must use force sparingly, but not be afraid to use it when our vital national interests are at stake."

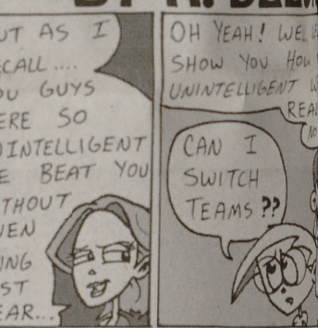
