**Halloween hackers hit the Associated Press**

NEW YORK (AP) — Hackers gained access yesterday to the corporate Website of the Associated Press and displayed a Halloween greeting with a poem by Edgar Allan Poe.

The page placed on the AP site carried the name of the "United Loan Gunmen." That name has appeared on break-ins at six other sites since August, including those of the Drudge Report, C-Span and ABC. AP news operations were unaffected.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton hopes his quick trip to Oslo, Norway, could begin a final push toward earning a place in history as an honored peacemaker.

Clinton has picked an agreement between Israel and the Arabs as his top foreign-policy priority. It also could be his best chance for a shining legacy.

Israel and the Palestinians have given themselves until September to conclude an overall settlement.

**South Korea suffers deadliest fire in 25 years**

INCHON, South Korea (AP) — South Korea's deadliest fire in a quarter-century was a disaster waiting to happen, a weekend crowd of teen-agers partying in an unlicensed beer bar so crowded waitresses could hardly move around the tables.

The only exit from the dimly lit bar was a stairway barely 1 yard wide. There were no fire alarms and no sprinklers in the nightspot in Incheon, a port city 30 miles west of Seoul.

With 55 people dead after Saturday night's fire, police sought arrest warrants yesterday for five people: four electricians they said ignored safety procedures and a teen-ager accused of inadvertently starting the fire while working on a new karaoke club in the basement of the three-story building. The five face charges of involuntary manslaughter.

Doctors feared the number of dead could rise, as some of the 74 people injured were in critical condition.

One survivor said workers in the Live II Hof told the teen-aged partygoers not to worry when flames and smoke climbed up the only exitway and began seeping through the door.

"It's nothing serious," 17-year-old Suh Min-jong said a worker told them.

"Then somebody shouted, 'Fire!' And people rushed for the exit, but there already was smoke

and fire there, so they rushed towards the kitchen in a stampede," Kim Soo-kyong, 18, who waited tables at the bar, said.

"They yelled for help and stumbled over each other. I felt feet on my back. The lights were out. I felt a hot wind in my face, and I passed out. When I woke up, I was in hospital," Kim, who is recovering from smoke inhalation and light burns on her hands and back said.

President Kim Dae-jung has ordered his government to step up safety inspections. He issued a similar order four months ago when 19 kindergartners and four adults were killed in a fire at a seaside summer camp in western South Korea.

The fire began Saturday night as revelers partied to ear-splitting music and two teen-age

workers cleaned the floor of a newly painted club in the basement. The supervisor was gone, and they hurriedly mopped the splattered floor with paint thinner.

According to police, one of them inadvertently broke an incandescent light with his mop, causing a spark and igniting the inferno. The two faces charges of involuntary manslaughter. The other was killed in the fire.

Police believe electricians ignored safety procedures while doing renovations in the building. They removed sprinklers to do their work and left teen-agers to do the cleanup, unsupervised.

Most of the victims were high school students who were drinking in the second-floor beer bar. In South Korea, it is illegal to serve alcohol to admit those under 18. The building had no emergency exit, and many teens perished in the dense smoke.

Police also were looking for the bar owner who ran away after the fire.

Firefighters found victims sprawled near the kitchen. Others were discovered in narrow aisles between the tables.

Saturday's fire was the worst since a hotel killed 88 people in Seoul in 1974. Three years before that, another hotel fire killed 165 people
