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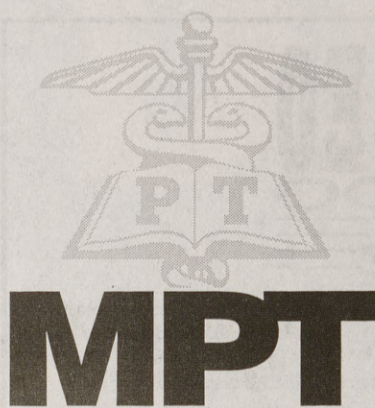

## 'Aftershock' destroys New York

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Let's face it, movie makers and television producers love to beat up on New York City.

It's been stomped on by a giant lizard, swallowed by a tidal wave and smashed by an asteroid.

Now CBS is shaking and rattling it in "Aftershock: Earthquake in New York," airing Sunday and Tuesday. "Aftershock" opens in Manhattan with joggers in Central Park, street vendors in Times Square and workers grabbing coffee on their way to work.

Hours later, a magnitude-7.0 earthquake crumbles the city.

The story follows an only-in-New-York cast of characters through the debris of what was once their city as they struggle to survive unimaginable devastation.

There's a struggling ballerina (Jennifer Garner of Fox's "Time of Your Life") who, after diving for cover from falling bricks, finds romance

with a cabbie (*Armageddon* alumnus Frederick Weller).

Then there's the defense attorney (Lisa Nicole Carson of "Ally McBeal"), who survives the quake in a subway tunnel with her just-found-innocent-of-murder-but-really-guilty client.

To round out the cast, there is a feuding mayor (Charles Dutton of "Oz") and fire chief (Tom Skerritt of "Picket Fences") as well as a transplanted California couple, apparently the only two people who remembered to stand in a doorway during a quake.

The standout performance, though, is Emmy winner Cicely Tyson, who portrays the mayor's mother. She spends much of the movie trapped underneath a wooden beam of a destroyed church, preaching salvation to a street tough.

Even with limited dialogue and mobility, she turns out her typical quality performance.

"Aftershock" is a story posed to be fun — the Big One cored. But this effort is too seriously focusing on the characters' relationship than their struggle to survive. It is too many loose ends and credits roll.

Under the direction of M. Lomon, who flooded a small Hard Rain and created a wonderland in *The Abyss*, the quake wreaks uncomfortable destruction on the city.

The Guggenheim Museum lapses, the World Trade twin towers tilt, the Empire Building crumbles and Rock Center is buried under rubble. Street is flattened, the Manhattan Bridge snaps and the Statue of Liberty takes a nosedive into the sea.

It's television disaster best, eclipsing its '70s predecessor "Earthquake," which drew Los Angeles.

## Jerry Seinfeld, Jessica Sklar announce engagement

NEW YORK (AP) — Jerry Seinfeld, television's consummate sitcom bachelor for nine years, is taking the real-life plunge with a woman who dumped her new husband for him.

The comedian reportedly popped the question to Jessica Sklar last week during a romantic dinner out.

Seinfeld spokesperson Elizabeth Clark would only confirm yesterday that the two are engaged and "very happy."

Sklar, who works for a public-relations firm, hooked up with Seinfeld in August 1998, soon after returning from her three-week

honeymoon in Italy with Eric Nederlander, a producer. Nederlander filed for divorce in October.

"I've moved on," Nederlander told "Inside Edition." "Things are great with me. She's his problem now."

The New York tabloids chronicled the relationship between Seinfeld, 45, and Sklar, 28. Seinfeld'sposal made front-page news in the *New York Times* and the *Daily News*.

On "Seinfeld," the comedian dated an endless stream of women, inevitably finding some strange way to ve them off.
