In a joint effort with the College of Education, the College of Veterinary Medicine's Center of Environmental and Rural Health is leading a program to increase interest among rural public-school students in the areas of science and health.

Larry Johnson, a veterinary medicine anatomy professor, said the program began a month ago and will not only facilitate interest in health and science but also will provide students practical knowledge about public health. Johnson said the program targets middleschool students in rural areas and 60 percent of the participants will be minority students — 50 percent Hispanic and 10 percent African-American.

"[The program] prepares public-

school students to become and remain interested in science and college and to be better Texas A&M University] students when they get here,' Johnson said.

Trina Davis, program director, said need studies were conducted prior to proposing a program. These studies, Davis said, indicated one of the most pressing needs in school curriculum is public-health instruction


