The Senate also will vote whether to move election dates to after Spring Break.

"If this bill is passed, the elections for such positions as student body president, [Residence Hall Association] officers, class council and yell leaders will be moved permanently after Spring Break."

Dobbs said the Election Date Bill will reverse last year's bill if passed. Last year's bill gave the election commissioner the authority to set the election dates.

Paul Jackman, rules and regulations chair and a junior aerospace engineering major, said new legislation concerning the placement of the polling site at Sbis Dining Hall also will be discussed.

Jackman said the Senate is considering moving the site to the All Faiths Chapel because of Sbis Dining Hall and Underground Market renovation scheduled for the Spring.

Other items of business at the meeting will be a discussion of budgeting for Student Government Association organizations, freshman and transfer-student midterm academic advising and the acceptance of minors in the Lowry Mays College of Business.

In May 1998, India set off five nuclear tests. Two weeks later, Pakistan conducted tests of its own. In April 1999, both countries tested nuclear-capable ballistic missiles. Both the countries and the United States refused to sign the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty for nuclear weapons.

Will Gammell, Wiley Lecture Series chair and a senior speech communication major, said the speakers were brought to A&M to give students an opportunity to raise their awareness of foreign affairs. He said he did not know much about the India - Pakistan conflict but he looked forward to learning about the region from the symposium.



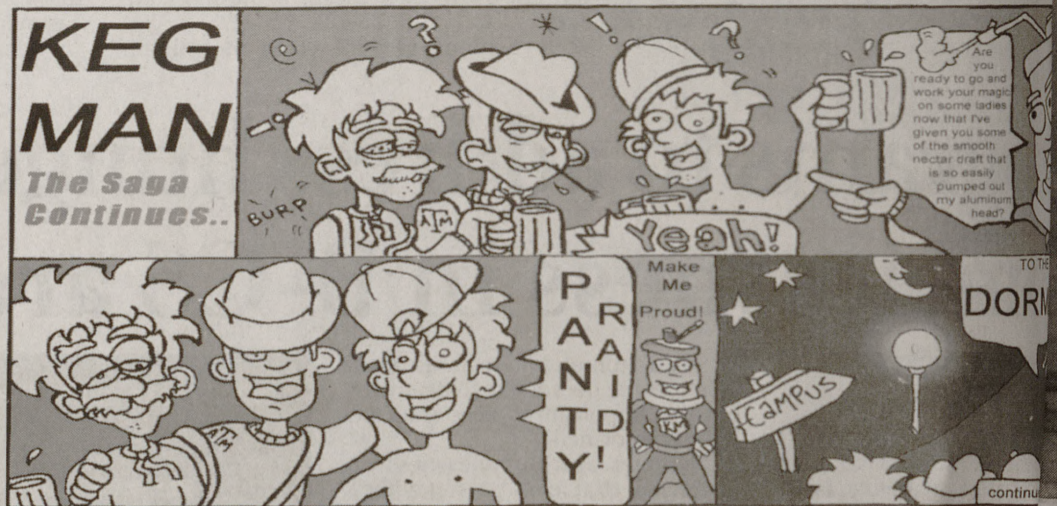
