ATTENTION: UNDERGRADUATE
& GRADUATE STUDENTS

Students who will either complete all of the following requirements after the Fall '99 semester final grades are posted, or after commencement, may order their rings beginning approximately January 18, 2000 for April 2000 delivery. Please visit the Aggie Ring Office in the Clayton Williams Alumni Center beginning December 13 to complete an audit request and to receive order information. In the event you will not be in the College Station area between January 18 and February 11 to place your order in person, please pick up a mail order form and be sized for your ring between December 13 & 21.

Any student or former student who completed all the requirements as of summer '99, must visit the Aggie Ring Office to complete a ring audit no later than December 8 to order their ring by the December 10 deadline for March 2, 2000 delivery.

Undergraduate Student Requirements:

You must be a degree seeking student and have completed all of the following requirements to order an Aggie ring:

- 95 cumulative undergraduate credit hours reflected on the Texas A&M University Student Information Management System degree audit. (A course passed with a grade letter of D or better, which is repeated and passed, cannot count as additional credit hours unless the catalog states the course may be repeated for credit. The lowest grade is the repeated course.)
- 60 undergraduate credit hours must have been completed in residence at Texas A&M University if your first semester at Texas A&M University was January 1994 or thereafter, or if you attended prior to 1994 and do not qualify under the successful semester requirement defined in the following paragraph. The 60 credit hour requirement will be waived if your degree is conferred with less than 60 A&M credit hours. The waiver will not be granted until after your degree is posted to screens #123 & #136 of the Student Information Management System.
- 30 undergraduate credit hours must have been completed in residence at Texas A&M University, providing that prior to January 1, 1994, you were enrolled at Texas A&M University and successfully completed either a fall/spring semester or summer term (I and II or 10 weeks) as a full-time student in good standing (A full-time student is defined in the university catalog as one that completes 12 credit hours with a 2.0 GPR in a spring or fall semester; or 4 credit hours with a 2.0 GPR in a 10 week session.)

Please remember that you will lose resident credits if you pass a course at A&M with a D or better and retake it at another institution and make a higher grade. The lowest grade is always deducted by the university as a repeated class.

- 2.0 cumulative GPR at Texas A&M University.
- Be in good standing with the University, including no registration or transcript blocks for past due fees, loans, parking tickets, returned checks, etc.

Graduate Student Requirements:

If you are a December 1999 degree candidate and do not have an Aggie ring from a prior degree, you may place an order after you meet the following requirements:

- Your degree is conferred and posted on the Texas A&M University Student Information Management System; and
- You are in good standing with the University, including no registration or transcript blocks for past due fees, loans, parking tickets, returned checks, etc.

However, if you have completed all of your course work prior to this semester and have been cleared by the thesis clerk, you may request a "letter of completion" from the Office of Graduate Studies (providing it is not past their deadline). The original letter of completion, with the seal, may be presented to the Ring Office in lieu of your degree being posted.

Procedure to order a ring:

- If you meet all of the above requirements and you wish to receive your ring on March 2, 2000, you must visit the Ring Office **no later than Wednesday, December 8, 1999** between the hours of 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. to complete the application for eligibility verification.

It is recommended that you do not wait until December 8 to apply for your ring audit. Should there be a problem with your academic record, or if you are blocked, you may not have sufficient time to resolve these matters before the order closes out on December 10.

- Return **no later than December 10, 1999** between the hours of 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. to check on the status of your audit and if qualified, pay in full by cash, check, money order, or your personal Discover, Visa or MasterCard (with your name imprinted).

Toy Story 2

Starring the voices of Tom Hanks and Tim Allen
Directed by John Lasseter

Toy Story 2 originally was going to be released exclusively on video, as most of Disney's sequels are. However, as production drew to a close, Disney realized it had a winner and decided to release the film in theaters — one of Disney's best decisions.

Toy Story 2 is breaking box-office records and is one of the few sequels that actually surpasses the original.

After rescuing another toy from a garage sale, Woody (Hanks) is stolen by a slimy toy-store owner, Buzz Lightyear (Allen) and the rest of the toys are forced to pull out all the stops to make their way across town and rescue Woody before he can be packed up and shipped to a toy museum in Japan.

Buzz gets to meet a new and improved version of himself, complete with a utility belt, and Woody is introduced to a side of himself he never knew existed and makes some new friends. Despite these entertaining asides, the movie ultimately is a story of loyalty and the power of friendship, giving the movie a winning feeling.

Filled with many jokes only adults will appreciate, the movie also treats children to plenty of slapstick and entertaining eye candy.

Director John Lasseter, who helmed the past two Disney/Pixar collaborations (*Toy Story*, *A Bug's Life*) continues to raise the bar for computer animation. The movie's animation is simply amazing.

Toy Story 2 is a genuine crowd-pleaser for people of all ages. More ambitious than its predecessor, this touching and hilarious movie is an instant classic in the truest sense of the word. (Grade: A)

End of Days

Starring Arnold Schwarzenegger and Gabriel Byrne
Directed by Peter Hyams

Schwarzenegger vs. Satan in New York City at the end of the millennium, fighting for the fate of the world. Does it get any bigger than this?

Despite Arnold's claim to the contrary, *End of Days* is a rocking, wildly entertaining action movie, complete with M-16s and an awesome subway wreck.

What separates this film from Schwarzenegger past movies is the depth of his character. Jericho Crane (Schwarzenegger) an alcoholic ex-cop contemplating suicide until a series of strange events leads him to Christine York (Robin Tunney), who has been marked by Satan worshippers to bear the Antichrist. When the devil arrives on Earth in human form as "The Man" (Byrne) and attempts

to claim his prize, Crane is the only one who can save Christine.

Director Hyams (*Timecop*, *The Relic*) a great job of using shadows and darkness to give this grim thriller the appropriate quality.

Schwarzenegger turns in one of his most memorable performances. Playing a disheveled hero with a quirky sense of humor.

Byrne is mesmerizing as Satan, despite delivering wicked lines with a charming ner. Byrne is the perfect devil — evil yet charming, persuasive yet commanding.

Tunney is great as a woman pursued by Satan, and Kevin Pollack is at his wisecracking best.

End of Days intelligently tackles religious issues and in doing so, raises some interesting questions, but what propels the movie is its execution. . . Exhilarating and creative, *End of Days* is a devilishly good movie. (Grade: B)

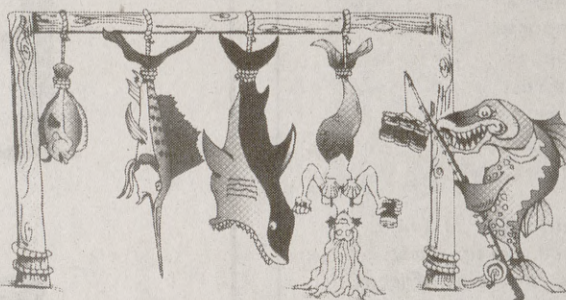

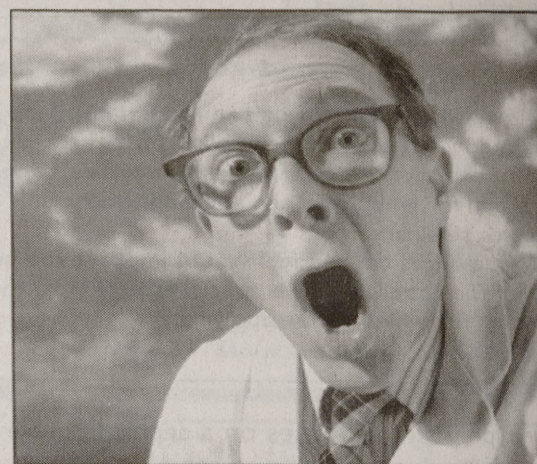
