Clinton asks for \$27 million to ensure equal pay for equal work

support of a women's soccer star, President Clinton plans to ask Congress on Monday for \$27 million to bolster federal laws requiring that employers pay men and women equal wages for equal

"We want to make sure that the employers and employees all understand their rights and responsibil-

ities on equal pay,' White House Domestic Policy Adviser Bruce Reed said Sunday. Officials also want to beef up enforcement of equal pay laws.

Women earn an average of 75 cents for every dollar men are paid, a disparity Clinton has pointed to in the past as evidence of social injustice.

"When a woman is denied equal pay, it doesn't just hurt her," he said in a radio address last January. "It hurts her family, and that hurts America." Clinton




