Conference encourages high schoolers to examine opportunities

A life of low-paying, menial labor may seem a bleak reality for millions of disadvantaged high school students, but Minority Enrichment and Development through Academic and Leadership Skills (MEDALS) is trying to show some of these students that there is a ray of hope in higher education.

MEDALS is holding a conference Friday and Saturday in the Memorial Student Center with the aim of encouraging high school

students to explore their career opportunities after graduation. "MEDALS is all about getting [high school students] to do something positive after high school - whether it is college, or military, or anything like that," Katiuska Quintero, the executive director of the conference and a senior bilingual education major, said.

Quintero said MEDALS will also be awarding two \$1,000 scholarships and two \$500 scholarships at the conference.

Sandra Medina, coordinator of Communications and Outreach at the Department of Multicultural Services, said the conference is targeted at ethnic minorities but is open to all students.

We try to reach the high schools that are socio-economically disadvantaged and have higher ethnic populations," she said. "But it is open to all students from all backgrounds."

Medina said the Department of Multicultural Services has been involved in the conference since it was founded 10 years ago.

"It started in 1990 as a component of the Southwestern Black Leadership Conference, but it got to be too big so they created [MEDALS]," she said.
