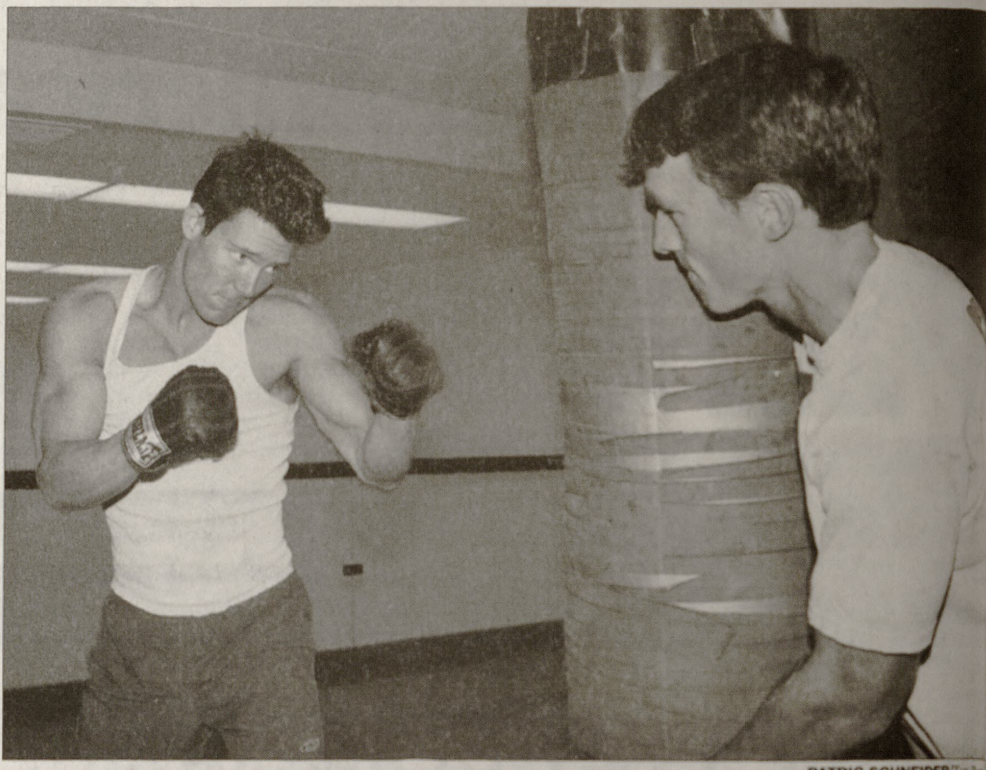

Volunteer fair hopes to draw new recruits

Sherry Hostetter is looking for a few good volunteers.

Hostetter, director of the Brazos Valley Rape Crisis Center, is hoping to find students willing to fit volunteer work at the Center into their schedules.

"Right now, we have 27 [volunteers] but we would like to have 45 to 50," she said. "We have a lot of A&M students but we tend to lose people at graduation."

The Volunteer Opportunity Fair, being held in the Memorial Student Center Flag Room Feb. 1 and 2, draws community service and students together.

The fair, sponsored by the Volunteer Services Center, will host over 25 agencies, including Phoebe's Home, the Brazos County Rape Crisis Center and Habitat for Humanity.

"Aggies are very giving to the community. This is an opportunity to let them see what is out there and let them choose," Lori Salter, coordinator for the

Volunteer Services Center, a branch of the Department of Student Activities, said.

"Like the fair last semester, we expect a good mix of individuals looking to get

involved as well as group leadership."

Salter said the exact amount of community service done by Aggies is not known because there is no mechanism for the 700 student organizations to report their service hours to the University.

Jennifer Spelce, president of the ser-

vice fraternity Alpha Phi Omega, said major, said Alpha Phi Omega is the largest contributor of community service on campus and expects to see more members at the fair.

"We have 200 active members, 150 pledges and contribute over 10,000 service hours each semester," Elise Waltman, director of the fair, said.

Waltman said many volunteers would be worthwhile for not only well as members of organizations but also for the fair.

Door prizes, including gifts from The Grapevine and EOC grants, will be given out to the winners.

One result of the student input indicated many students did not know that the on-campus buses were free. The proposal contains several options for accomplishing this, including color-coded maps of campus and information kiosks throughout campus.

Students will have an opportunity to learn more about the task force's numerous proposals at an open forum, slated for later this month.

Miller stresses the need for all members of the Aggie community to be aware of upcoming changes and emphasizes that it will take the cooperation of everyone to realize the task force's vision.

The group's recommendations on topics ranging from campus maps to bus routes will be considered by Bowen and other University officials.

Society claimed, "The president does not acknowledge we have problems."

The issue did not hamper African-American student enrollment for the next semester.

More than 50 African-American students were enrolled for the Fall 1969 semester, making the total enrollment at Texas A&M University 12,000 students.

Special celebrations focusing on the African-American community began in the late '60s on campus for the African-American students.

Two dates — 1966 and 1969 — appear in University archives

as the first dates known to celebrate.

"This is a holiday of recognition to recognize African-American history," Ron Miller, speaker at the '66 celebration, said.

Almost 10 years after the first Afro-American student demands, the first African-American student football team.

Hugh T. McElroy Jr., '71, was the first African-American student to start the football team.

In regards to the enrollment of African-American students at A&M, Vergel L. Gay Jr., '73, said, "This is a reality that is becoming more and more sensitive, but not yet sensitive, we quite there yet."
