The first Replant was held in the spring of 1991, when Scott Hantman of the Student Government Environmental Issues Committee teamed up with Bonfire leaders to plant 400 trees.

Later that year, Replant was named an official Aggie Tradition by the Texas A&M Traditions Council. Replant became an official Student Government Committee in 1994.
