The festival hopes to spread understanding of the oral and traditional literature of the African-American, Asian-American, Hispanic-American, Jewish American and Native American cultures.

Workshops and storytelling sessions conducted by storytellers Waynetta Ausmus, Elida Bonet, Doc Moore, Otis Roper Jr., Gayle Ross and Tim Tingle will make up the festival.

"We hope to create an awareness of the importance of storytelling and to use it as an instructional tool," said Johnnieque Love, an assistant professor in the library department and organizer of the festival.

The event is open to the public and is sponsored by the Sterling C. Evans Library's Education and Media Services (EDMS) and the College of Education. Fourth through sixth graders at Allen Academy are expected to attend, along with students from three other elementary schools and one middle school.

Paterson appointed dean of student life




