## Gunfire erupts at National Zoo six children receive shot wounds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A running scuffle between two groups of youths erupted into gunfire at the crowded National Zoo, leaving six young people recovering from gunshot wounds.

The popular tourist attraction, which was crowded with thousands of people celebrating, when the shooting occurred Monday afternoon, was closed today as police continued their investigation.

Although police had said the most severely wounded, an 11-year-old boy, was brain dead, Children's National Medical Center said today his condition had improved and he was responding to care. "Although the child remains in critical condition, a repeat CT scan of the head continues stable," said Dr. Martin R. Eichelberger, director of trauma services at the hospital.

Police Chief Charles Ramsey said today that officers know who they are looking for. A police source who asked not to be identified said there is no evidence that more than one shooter was involved. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People posted a \$25,000 reward.

Police said they were investigating whether the shootings were gang related and sought at least one teen-age gunman who fired a handgun into groups of youths after a confrontation escalated to bottle throwing and then shots.

pens, had ready access to guns and the results speak for themselves," Mayor Anthony Williams said today on CBS' "The Early Show."

The shooting victims ranged in age from 11 to 16 and were attending a century-old post-Easter gathering celebrating African-American families.

Police said the seventh victim, a teen-ager, showed up at a hospital overnight for treatment of a gunshot wound to the thumb.

A 12-year-old girl was in serious condition with a leg wound, and three others were hospitalized with less serious injuries. Another person in the vicinity of the shooting, a pregnant woman, was taken to a hospital after experiencing abdominal pain.

The 111-year-old zoo, a unit of the Smithsonian Institution, is one of the most-visited sites in the nation, drawing 3 million local residents and tourists each year. Nestled on 163 acres in one of the wealthiest neighborhoods, it has seldom seen violence and was better known for the pandas it housed for over two decades.

Susanna Wurminen, 20, a zoo volunteer, arrived for work this morning to find the zoo gathered and a sign alerting visitors that the zoo was closed today. Two bunches of flowers were laid on the sidewalk outside the gate.

Wurminen, on a five-week stay in Washington, surprised to hear of the shootings. "Nothing like this would happen in Sweden," she said. "That happens in the pubs in Sweden in the zoo."

The gunfire broke out shortly after daylight and stunned visitors.

## Elian to spend time with family, friends

WASHINGTON (AP) — At the request of Juan Miguel Gonzalez, four playmates of his son, Elian, will be allowed to come from Cuba to visit him here for about two weeks, the State Department said Tuesday.

Spokesman James P. Rubin said visas requests from the four will be dealt with on an expedited basis once they are received. One adult will be permitted to accompany each child.

Rubin noted that the department issued visas almost three weeks ago to Elian's former kindergarten teacher, a pediatrician and a male cousin. They

have not used the visas but may do so at any time, Rubin said.

President Clinton urged that Elian's family be given "the space it needs to heal its wounds and strengthen its bonds." He also commended federal agents for their armed seizure of the boy from relatives in Miami. "They had a very, very difficult job to do with no easy choices," the president said. "I am grateful that they were able to safely reunite the young boy with his father."

He spoke at a White House ceremony about anti-hate crime legislation, and warmly commended Attorney General Janet Reno for her leadership.

Elian, his father, stepmother and half brother departed Andrews Air Force Base today, the Marshals Service announced. Rubin said they were being moved to the

Aspen Institute's secluded Wye River facility on Maryland's Eastern Shore to await court action over whether Elian should be allowed to return to Cuba.

The Marshals Service remained with the family for protection, said Marshals spokesman Drew Wade.

Meanwhile, Reno, who has voiced "no regrets whatsoever" for the raid that returned Elian to his father, defended her tactics in a 1 1/2-hour closed-door session with lawmakers. She declined to speak to reporters as she left the Capitol.

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., the first senator to leave the meeting and a defender of the administration's handling of Saturday's seizure of the 6-year-old boy, said Reno "was objective."

"The law was followed," Leahy told reporters. However, he said the

atmosphere was "still very tense." Sen. Connie Mack, R-Ohio, said the military-style raid, said his son's mind had not been affected by Reno's presentation.

"I am going to recommend that the Senate engage in a hearing on the use of force," Mack said, deeply troubled, horrified at the fact that our government has an armed force in a family home of a 6-year-old child."

The session came as preliminary inquiries into Saturday's seizure started in both the House and Senate.

Republicans, and a handful of Democrats aligned with those who block Elian's return to Cuba, criticized their criticism of what the Justice Department's strong-
