Bush criticized for inaction

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. George W. Bush, who was on the campaign trail Wednesday, got a double dose of criticism in his home state.

Civil rights groups demanded that Bush seek the resignation of the state health commissioner over his comments about teen pregnancy and Hispanics, while some Republican women urged Bush to block new pollution permits in Houston, the nation's smoggiest city.

Members of several advocacy and minority groups, meanwhile, called on the Republican presidential nominee-in-waiting to demand the resignation of Texas Health Commissioner Reyn Archer.

Archer has been under fire since saying earlier this month that Hispanics are culturally resistant to the idea that "getting pregnant is a bad thing."

"If I were to go to a Hispanic community and say, 'Well, we need to get you into family planning,' they say, 'No, I want to be pregnant,'" he told *The New York Times*.

Archer issued a written apology and followed up with an in-person apology to state lawmakers.

But on Wednesday, the Texas Freedom Network, League of United Latin American Citizens, Mexican-American Legal Defense & Educational Fund and Rainbow Coalition said apologies weren't enough.

"The irresponsible and bigoted state-

ments issued by Texas State Health Commissioner Dr. William R. Archer III have caused great harm to all Texans," said Gil Gamez, of Texas LULAC.

"We're putting Governor Bush on notice: as his appointee to the post of commissioner of health, Archer's comments only fuel questions about Governor Bush's tolerance of racism and sexism," said Samantha Smoot, director of the Texas Freedom Network.

"These questions will persist until Commissioner Archer resigns," said Smoot, whose group was founded in 1995 to counter the political power of religious conservatives.

Archer "has no plans to resign," said his spokesperson, Doug McBride.

"Again, he regrets the wrong impressions. He's apologized. He's looking forward to working with all Texans to address the public health issues of all Texans," McBride said.

Bush spokesperson Mike Jones said the governor is satisfied with Archer's apology and wouldn't seek his resignation.

"Dr. Archer has explained and apologized for his awkward and inarticulate language and explained his true positions. Teen pregnancy is a serious problem in every segment in society and that's why the governor has addressed it as a priority in Texas," Jones said. "Governor Bush does not tolerate racism in any form."

LaMesa prison riot claims one inmate

LAMESA (AP) — Prison officials Wednesday continued investigating a riot at a West Texas lockup involving about 300 black and Hispanic inmates, some wielding garden tools, that left one inmate dead and five others in intensive care.

The Tuesday night melee at the minimum- to medium-security Smith Unit left a total of 31 prisoners injured. The prison about 60 miles south of Lubbock remained under lockdown Wednesday.

"We believe it was very racially motivated," said Larry Todd, a Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokesperson.

Another prison spokesperson, Larry Fitzgerald, said the riot appeared to center in the prison's recreation yard but evolved out of a fight involving two inmates in a dining hall.

It was there that a Hispanic inmate confronted a black inmate who was fondling himself in front of a female officer, Fitzgerald said. Word of the confrontation then spread.

"It started off with a small fight, and the guards got that under control. Then another group got one, and the fight got bigger and bigger until it got to the point of a riot," said John Barton, spokesman for Warden Lupe Lozano.

"Some white inmates joined the fight, but it was mostly black and Hispanic inmates who were injured," Todd said.

One of the prison's kitchen gutted by fire in the melee.

State corrections officials took about 300 guards to subdue an equal number of inmates. The balance began around 6:30 p.m. and under control by midnight, Barton said.

Guards used a pepper spray substance to subdue the inmates. A guard suffered minor injuries from a gas grenade that went off in the riot. Two other guards also were injured. All three were treated and returned to work, Todd said.

Snickers shoplifter to get new trial

TYLER (AP) — An East Texas man sentenced to 16 years in prison for swiping a \$1 candy bar will get a new day in court after a judge found evidence of jury misconduct during his trial.

Visiting Judge Gene Ater ruled Tuesday that Kenneth Payne III deserves a new trial after two jurors admitted that Payne's failure to testify in his case was considered during deliberations.

The two also said a fellow juror, a former corrections officer, told jurors that Payne would still get out within four or five years, even if they gave him a 16-year sentence. Judge Ater set Payne's bond at \$3,000 and scheduled a new trial

for June 26. However, Payne's bond out of jail because of his revocation.

Constable claims election violation

GALVESTON (AP) — A constable in Galveston County who narrowly lost in an April 11 runoff election has filed a lawsuit asking the results be set aside because of unspecified violations.

In the lawsuit, Daniel Crow said the results of the runoff were inaccurate.

Galveston County District Attorney Mike Guarino said there have been no requests for his office to investigate election fraud regarding the constable's race.

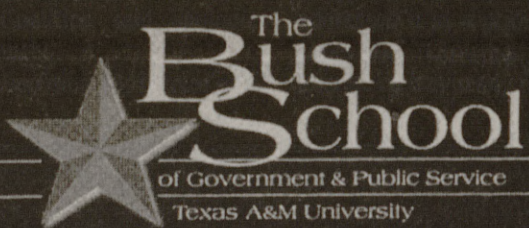

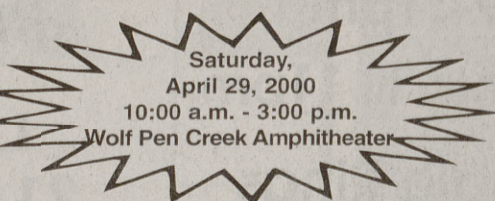
