English racial attack targets black man

BIRMINGHAM, England (AP)—A black man was verbally abused and then set on fire Monday, an attack police said was racially motivated. The 24-year-old man, whose name was not released pending notification of relatives, was listed in stable condition at Selly Oak Hospital with burns to his face and right arm. His injuries were not thought to be life-threatening. "There appears to be no motive for the attack apart from the fact it was racially motivated," said West Midlands Police Detective Chief Inspector Neil James. "It was a particularly vicious attack aggravated by the fact that the victim was abused verbally prior to being set alight."

Three white men were sought for questioning, one described as a skinhead. Authorities said the victim was walking his girlfriend home early hours when he was attacked. Forensic tests were being carried out to determine the cause of the attack. The man was set on fire, and the street where the attack occurred was so hot that so many people fled that police could not search for the victim, who remained in Birmingham, which is a working-class area. Birmingham is a base for trade and manufacturing, is England's second largest city, located about 100 miles northwest of London.

5 nuclear powers pledge to disarm

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Five nuclear powers pledged Monday to completely eliminate their nuclear weapons but gave no timetable for new plans to actually get rid of their arsenals. In a joint statement, the United States, Russia, China, France and Britain said they were "unequivocally committed" to fulfilling the goal of a world free of nuclear arms. The statement was issued at a U.N. conference reviewing the 1999 Aggie Bonfire treaty, and was already under criticism from disarmament groups as not going far enough. The five powers pledged support for international efforts to negotiate a treaty on general disarmament as well as a ban on the production of nuclear weapons. The statement only listed the original five nuclear powers in the treaty and not nuclear states such as India, Pakistan or Israel. The five powers have come under intense criticism during the conference for having failed to make progress on nuclear disarmament in the 30 years since the treaty has been in force. In the treaty, the five pledged to work to eliminate nuclear weapons if countries without nuclear arms promised not to obtain the weapons. The United States has come under severe criticism for its proposals to try to amend the 1997 Anti-Ballistic Missile treaty to build a limited missile defense system. Russia, China and most other countries at the treaty conference have denounced the move, saying it would undermine the basic tenets of arms control and lead to a new arms race.

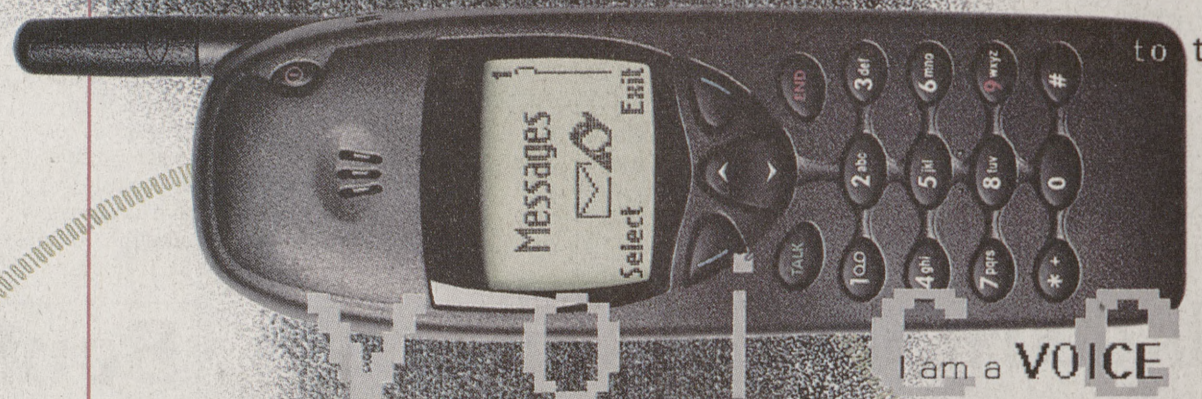
4 die in Jakarta train collision

MEKAR SARI, Indonesia (AP)—Two trains collided head-on southwest of Jakarta Monday, and officials said at least four people were killed in the accident. The collision between a Jakarta-bound train and a train going from the capital to West Java town of Merak occurred at the village of Mekar Sari, about 21 miles southwest of Jakarta. Zainal Abidin, a spokesman for the state railroad company, said four passengers died on impact while 21 others were injured. "We are still investigating the cause of the accident but there is a possibility that a malfunctioning signal light caused it," he said. Hundreds of local residents rushed to the site to assist with recovery efforts. Drivers got out of their vehicles to gaze at the crumpled motives and railroad cars. A Jakarta radio station reported that a fifth passenger died after the accident, and Jakarta hospitals said they received a total of five bodies from the accident.

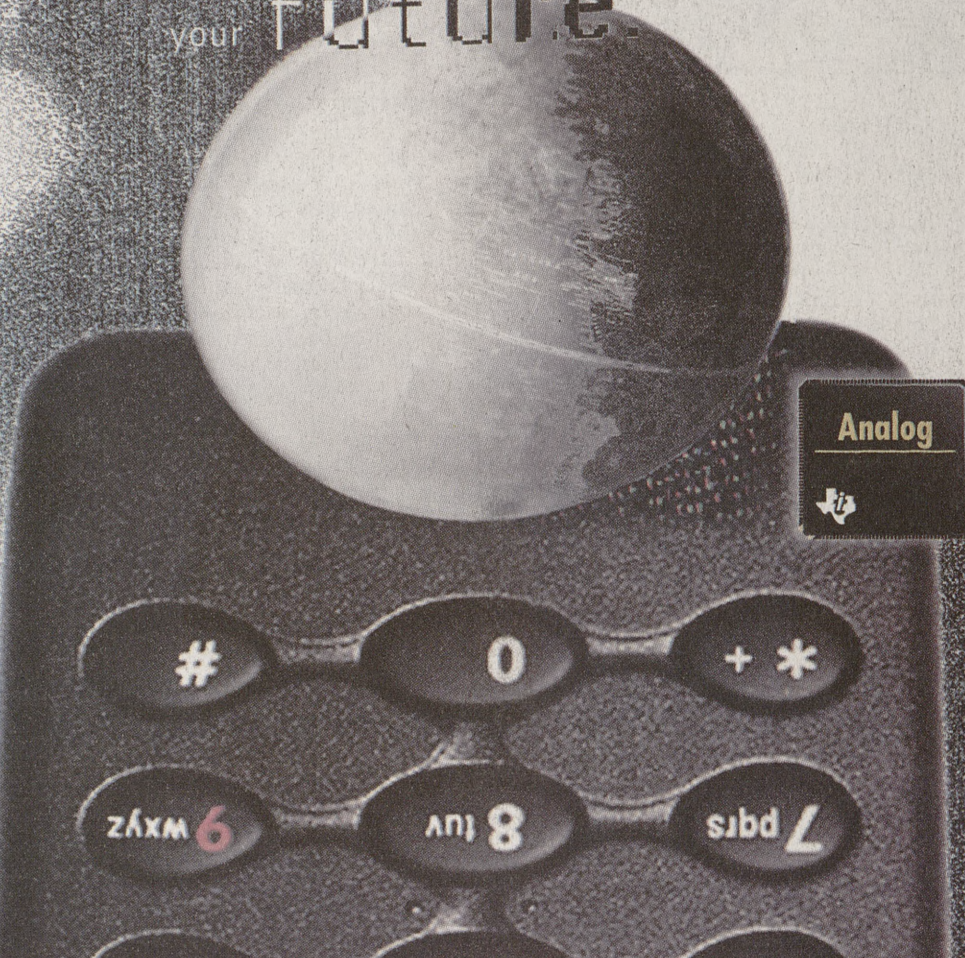

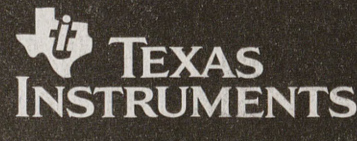
