employees could go to in order to receive benefits. The problem is that a DMO isn't based on an office copay, but rather it varies by procedure. It is also not as neat and clean as an HMO," Hassel said. "We hope to offer it Sept. 1, 2001. The reason for that is because dental organizations have not been built outside metropolitan areas and that is where most of our employees work."

Gerescher said the Systems office works with the insurance carriers to understand why premiums need to be raised.

"At the Systems office we understand that nobody wants higher premiums. We try very hard to work with the carriers. We have them prove to us why they need this increase," Gerescher said.

Hassel said premiums would probably continue to increase

because of the rising costs.

"Costs are going up, specifically in the next two years. Hopefully, legislature will increase contributions significantly. There are lags in funding, and that is what's happening right now. The overall cost, we know, is going to increase. People are using the heck out of their coverage and that is what is driving cost up," Hassel said.

Hassel said the baby boom generation is having a major influence on health care premium costs.

"We are just using the plan more. The baby boomers are having a major impact on this whole issue, and we are just now getting into our unhealthy years," Hassel said.

Employees will have an opportunity to make changes in their health plans during the annual benefit enrollment period, which will run July 1-31. Enrollment changes made during this period will be effective Sept. 1, 2000.

he wouldn't reveal his preference for a future place of employment.

"I'm not telling you. That's my honest answer," Martin said. "I don't have a home. I'm a nomad."

The Nets ran a battery of tests on Martin's leg and had their doctors take an extra close look at the injury. Martin also visited Vancouver and Orlando, although he said the Magic's doctors did not look at his leg.

The consensus national player of the year, Martin is a 6-foot-9 forward who averaged 18.9 points while shooting 57 percent from the field last season. He listed Kevin Garnett and Karl Malone as the players he most respected; Garnett for his intensity and Malone for his durability.

Although he is a bit undersized for the position, the Nets would be expected to use him at center in place of Jayson Williams, whose career is being brought to a premature end because of a broken leg.

Williams' injury, along with an injury that will keep Kerry Kittles sidelined at the start of the season, is the reason the Nets might be a little more skittish than most about picking a player coming off such an injury.

"I never missed a day of rehab," Martin said. "I told myself I was going to fight back from this no matter how long it took."

Swift, a 6-9 forward who averaged 16.2 points and shot 61 percent from the field last season as a sophomore, was surrounded Tuesday by Vancouver media eager to hear from the new species of player — one who says he would not mind playing in what is often considered the NBA's Siberia.

"I'm not saying I want to go to Vancouver, but I wouldn't mind playing there," Swift said. "Most people have their own perception of Vancouver and they've never been there. They're just going by rumors. But I liked the city and the people, and I had fun when I was there."

Fizer, a 6-8 forward who averaged 22.8 points while shooting 58 percent from the field, seemed resigned to the likelihood that he is headed to the Cleveland Cavaliers' perennial doormat. Like Michael Olowokandi, who preceded Lamar Odom before him, Fizer tried to look at the bright side.

"Everyone has to start somewhere," Fizer said. "The Clippers had a bad rap, but if they get this player or that player, who knows whether they'll turn around?"

Who knows, too, whether the Clippers will pass on Fizer and take Miles, an event that could cause a whole lot of reshuffling for the rest of the lottery teams.

The Cavaliers, Mavericks, SuperSonics, Trail Blazers and Raptors have been trying to move up.
