PTTS: Garage free after hours with tag
Parking, Traffic and Transportation Services (PTTS) announced last week that commuter students attending student organization meetings between the hours of 6 p.m. and 2 a.m. Monday through Thursday will be able to park in the Koldus Parking Garage for free. Students with blue parking hangtags will not be charged for parking if they enter and leave the garage during the designated time. Students entering the garage at 5:59 p.m. or earlier will be required to pay the standard rate of \$1 per hour throughout their stay in the garage. For ticket validation, students need to present their parking ticket and blue hangtags to the cashiers. Free parking will not be available during OPAS performances.

\$12,000 diamonds reported stolen
The College Station Police Department (CSPD) is investigating an alleged theft of \$12,000 worth of diamonds from a College Station jeweler. Pioneer Diamond Corp. of Houston notified the CSPD about the missing diamonds, saying that it was unable to get in touch with the owner of the jewelry store, located at 1405 Harvey Road, said Sgt. Dan Jones, public relations officer for CSPD. The diamonds were sent to the local jeweler on consignment to be sold in the College Station area. The profits were to be shared between the two businesses, Jones said. CSPD officials said that the store has been closed and that the investigation is pending.

KTFB is counting on the support of former students who have volunteered to step up and fill the roles of the band and yell leaders at the bonfire. The group has lawyers and engineers to oversee the planning and construction of the project. Several of these professionals are former students who sought out KTFB, but the organization went out of its way to hire an engineer from the University of Texas-Austin to get "an unbiased third opinion." Dyson said their leaders come from several backgrounds, including former Bonfire leaders. "People need to understand that things need to be fixed, not eradicated," Dyson said. Above all, KTFB said it is concerned with having a safe event. "The organization is merely to have a complete, safe engineered plan to present to the students," Dyson said. "We work for the students — the students are our whole concern."

are the most significant change of this year's MSC Open House. In addition to the new organizations, the fair will no longer be confined to the hallways of the MSC. This year's Open House will spread out across the breezeway and into Rudder Exhibit Hall. Amanda Arriaga, part of the MSC marketing team and a senior management major, said that approximately 40 organizations will be located in Rudder Exhibit Hall and a number of organizations will also set up on the breezeway. The success experienced by MSC Open House in previous years has not come without difficulty. The event attracts large crowds that often complicate movement around the complex, particularly for freshmen. "Usually it is the freshmen that browse around and try and pick up things at a variety of booths," said Luke Altendorf, senior associate director of the MSC. "Typically the upperclassmen know what they want to visit and don't stray too much." Sponsors hope the additional space will ease some of the congestion that has become synonymous with Open House. "That many people in this facility at one time can be rather crazy," Altendorf said. "What limited us in the past was the space issue, but now that we have increased that we are concerned about having enough tables. But even that is not much of a concern because we can always go out and rent tables," Altendorf said. A number of groups will be located outside near Rudder fountain and performing in the MSC Flagroom. Previous Flagroom demonstrations include Judo exhibitions and performances by the Singing Cadets and the Aggie Wranglers. MSC Open House is made possible by a \$30 dollar fee paid by each participating student organization. In addition to providing facilities for the event, the MSC handles all marketing functions for Open House.

Former Waco prosecutor targeted by counsel

HOUSTON (AP) — The former prosecutor who warned Attorney General Janet Reno of a possible cover-up within her own department has been told he is being targeted for prosecution by Waco Special Counsel John C. Danforth. Former assistant U.S. Attorney Bill Johnston has been a target of Danforth's office since he spent three days under interrogation last month in St. Louis, two government sources told the Associated Press on the condition of anonymity. Johnston's lawyer, Michael Kennedy, said his client has been told he could be indicted on charges including obstruction of justice and perjury. "This law office and Mr. Johnston believe that he was unfairly targeted for his frequent criticism of the U.S. government and for blowing the whistle on the government's efforts to mislead the public about the government's use of pyrotechnic devices against the Branch Davidians," Kennedy said in a statement. The charges reportedly stem from pretrial notes Johnston made in 1993 that show he may have been present at a meeting where "military rounds" were discussed.
