

DeRonnie Pitts punctuated an upand-down, back-and-forth game with a flying leap of faith.

Pitts cartwheeled into the end zone after catching a 15-yard touchdown pass from backup quarterback Chris Lewis with 1:12 to play as Stanford beat No. 5 Texas 27-24 on Saturday night.

Stanford led 20-9 with 10 minutes left, Texas' Major Applewhite rallied the Longhorns with two touchdown drives. The Cardinal (2-1) then made a frantic four-play, 59-yard drive in just 43 seconds.

It ended when Pitts caught a short sideline pass, broke Joe Walker's tackle at the 10, leaped for the goal line, was flipped into the air by Roderick Babers and landed in the end zone.

"I knew I was flying over him as soon as I got off that one tackle," Pitts said. "Chris made a great throw, and we set up the play perfectly. (The leap) was pretty scary, but I saw (Virginia Tech QB) Michael Vick do it today, so I thought I'd give it a shot."

"It's an absolutely fantastic feeling to beat a team of this caliber," said coach Tyrone Willingham, who called the victory one of the biggest of his tenure. "It shows the resilience of our young men to bounce back and not let the past affect them.'

With former Stanford golfer Tig Woods cheering on the sideling Lewis led a dramatic comeback place of starter Randy Fasani, wh injured his left knee when he wa sacked by Maurice Gordon just se en minutes into the game.

After the Texas offense wa stymied all evening by an inspire Stanford defense, Applewhite on nected with B.J. Johnson on a 71-va touchdown strike with 9:29 to play Applewhite then hit Victor Ike overt middle for a 38-yard scoring play with 5:44 left to give Texas a 24-20 lead

"The game definitely had a sens of the bizarre," Applewhite said. "V didn't play well until the fourth qu ter. We had some confidence and mo mentum in the fourth quarter, an when we got the big play, we real started feeding off that.'

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas Tech improved to 4-0 with a 26-0 victory over Louisiana-Lafayette, but quarterback Kliff Kingsbury said the Red Raiders can use next week off to let some bumps and bruises heal and to work on of-

The Red Raiders managed just 14 yards of offense during the third quarter.

'It was just one of those things," Kingsbury said. "We just had a spell where it seemed like we let up a little. We didn't come out and play as well as we're capable.'

Kingsbury's 2-yard pass to Tim Baker and field goals of 24 and 19 yards by Chris Burkholz gave the Red Raiders a 13-0 halftime lead over the Ragin' Cajuns (0-3). A 71-yard screen pass to Baker set up another touchdown.

"I let myself down and made some stupid mistakes," Cajun quarterback Jon Van Cleave said. "We moved the chains in the second half. We just have to finish drives.'

Tech intercepted Van Cleave three times and Wes Welker scored on a 63-yard punt return late in the third.

In the fourth, Baker took a screen pass 71 yards in the Tech 25 to the Cajun 4, and running back Rd Williams scored from there.

"I wished I would have scored, but I was trying to careful with the ball," Baker said. "I have confidence Ricky that when we get that close, he'll get it in then'

Kingsbury completed 24 of 37 passes for 240 ya with two interceptions. Williams carried 15 times for yards. Two weeks ago, Kingsbury threw for a schi record 456 yards against Utah State.

"I know sometimes it seems like we're taking ones forward and one step back, but I thought we had also tempo and we had a better attacking mentality," King bury said. "I think we're improving

Van Cleave completed 10 of 21 passes for 79 yard John Bernard was the visitors' leading rusher, gaining yards on 15 carries.

Tech's second field goal came after cornerback & A&M junio rick Briggs intercepted Van Cleave's deep pass at the Ta 36 with 49 seconds left in the second quarter.
