Mets, Yankees square off for 14th Subway Series on Saturday

NEW YORK (AP)—As if the Big Apple needed anything else to brag about, now it's got the Subway Series, baby! Don't like the Yankees or Mets? Fuhgeddaboutit.

"It will give New York an opportunity to be even more arrogant," Mayor Rudolph Giuliani said early Wednesday. "We'll be able to go around and say we have the two best teams in baseball."

And the whole thing played out on the biggest platform of all—the World Series. Game 1 is Saturday night at Yankee Stadium, with Andy Pettitte probably pitching against Mets ace Mike Hampton.

"I hope that people behave themselves, because it's going to split a few families up, I think," said Yankees manager Joe Torre. "I have a feeling the city is not going to be the same for this next 10 days—and maybe for some time after that."

Even *The New York Times*, the old gray lady herself, is giddy. For the first time in memory, the newspaper ran a banner over its flag, above news of the presidential debate and the Mideast crisis.

In red ink, no less.

"It's a Subway Series! Yankees Join Mets," the paper proclaimed.

Giuliani, a huge Yankees fan, predicted his favorite team will win in six games. He appeared Wednesday night on the Late Show with David Letterman, reading a Top Ten list of "Cool Things About Having the World Series in New York."

Among them: "We're gonna add a Mike Piazza-style mustache to the Statue of Liberty."

Forgive fans in other parts of the country for being far from excited.

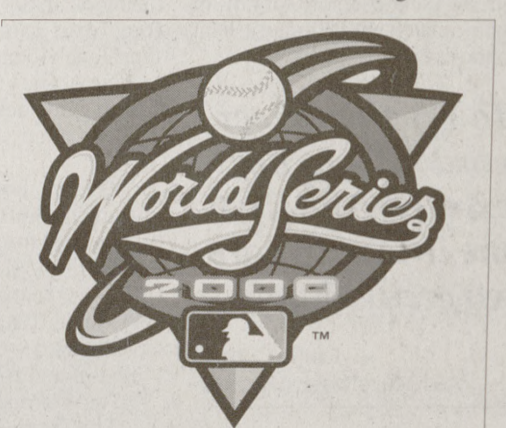
"It's a horror, is what it is," said Chris Gerstell, 24, who works at Boston Beer Works, next to Fenway Park. His Red Sox, haunted by the Yankees for most of the 20th century, lost the 1986 World Series to the Mets.

In Des Moines, Iowa, 48-year-old Stephanie Netolicky rolled her eyes when asked about the Subway Series.

"I thought you were talking about a sandwich shop," she said.

No matter. New Yorkers will be able to supply all the juice necessary for this matchup. It will be the 14th Subway Series overall, and the first since the Yankees played the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1956.

"There were only three channels then," recalled comedian Billy Crystal, celebrating in the clubhouse after the Yankees beat Seattle 9-7 late Tuesday night to clinch the AL championship series. "Now, the whole world will be watching."



A day earlier, the Mets finished off St. Louis in the NL championship series. They had their star power, too—actors Tim Robbins and Susan Sarandon poured champagne in the winning locker room.

And while the next few days will feature neat matchups on the field—Tino vs. Timo, Bernie vs. Benny—there also might be a lot to watch in the stands.

Mets star Piazza dates the Playmate of the Millennium. Yankees star Derek Jeter has been linked to Miss Universe.

The Yankees got a day off Wednesday to rest. A few Mets pitchers threw at Shea Stadium, though rain washed out a full workout.

The wet weather did nothing to dampen players' spirits.

"This is our chance to get a place on the said Mets outfielder Jay Payton. "When can walk around with their chins high bragging rights for a long time."

"There're more Yankee fans than Mets in the city. That's just a result of winning. People teams that win," he said. "The Yankees are definitely the team of the city."

The Yankees are trying to become the first to win three straight World Series championships since Oakland in 1972-74. The Mets came in 1986, when the team started Gooden, now pitching for the Yankees.

The teams met six times in interleague play, with the Yankees winning four times—already tense from the days when Yankees owner George Steinbrenner would emphasize on beating the Mets in spring games—was heightened after Roger Clemens beat Piazza.

As a result, Mets management banned players from using the weight room at Shea Stadium and also forbids its All-Stars from traveling to Yankees' All-Stars to the game in Atlanta.

Mets GM Steve Phillips on Wednesday said Yankees would be allowed to use his weight room, which is inside the Mets' clubhouse. Also, the Mets will probably take early practice at Sea before heading to Yankee Stadium.

City transit officials, meanwhile, planned extra No. 4 trains to the Lexington Avenue line will carry fans to Yankee Stadium and add No. 7 trains on the Flushing line to Shea Stadium.

The routes meet at Grand Central Terminal. Yankees second baseman Chuck Knauer has been known to ride the rails up to the Don't look for Piazza, though.

"There's no subway near my house," a Jersey resident said.

TCU kicking itself for missed opportunity

FORT WORTH (AP)—When Dennis Franchione was hired at TCU, he did the right thing for a coach taking over a 1-10 team.

Soon after taking the job in December of 1997, Franchione got the downtrodden Horned Frogs out of a scheduled "money" game against powerhouse Nebraska. His reasoning was simple.

Franchione figured the third season would be a pivotal year in his tenure at TCU. He did not want the Cornhuskers looming as the opener.

"If I would have known three years ago what I know today, I wouldn't have made any changes. We would have played the game," Franchione said. "But you know, we made the smart decision three years ago."

In 2000, that pivotal third year, the 11th-ranked Horned Frogs (5-0) are

one of five undefeated Division I-A teams in the country—another being No. 1 Nebraska (6-0)—and have their highest ranking since also being 11th in the preseason poll 40 years ago.

TCU has won 10 straight games, its longest winning streak since the school-record 14 in a row in 1937-38. The Frogs also have a legitimate Heisman Trophy candidate in LaDainian Tomlinson, the nation's

leading rusher at 194.8 yards per game.

Franchione always was optimistic about what TCU could eventually accomplish, but not even the Horned Frogs' first two seasons. Still, he have figured that the Frogs go into 2000 with their first season ranking since 1960 amid a perfect record.

Each has been an All-American, either as an individual or on a relay.

The men's sole newcomer is Michael Greene, a senior transfer from Ogden, Utah. Greene comes in as a veteran with swimming experience in two NCAA championship meets.

Nash said it would be hard to single out anyone as the star because so many of the swimmers have scored

points for the team in meets.

As for the meet on Nash said, it will be his team to face some competition outside of its ranks.

"It gives us a chance where we are at this various events," Nash said.

The meet against TCU begin at 5 p.m. Friday. Student Recreation Natatorium.
