students have as much at stake in the issues in each election as older generations do.

In many cases, students said mainstream issues such as fiscal policy and abortion and the general character of the candidates are important, but they also brought up a number of other items that they believe will have a major impact on the future of the country.

Jonathan Fricke and Eric Sutherland, both senior management information systems majors, said that issues such as equal rights and

legalization of marijuana are important to many college students.

Fricke added that people, and college students in particular, do not always base their decisions on the candidates' stances on the issues.

"I think it is a matter of who comes off cooler, not the issues," Fricke said. "No one really reads the literature or

knows the platforms except the most simplified versions."

Although the candidates connect with younger voters, it not always hit their mark, Allen said.

"I don't think they completely neglect college students," she said. "I think they try, but sometimes they don't quite understand young people

Clark said he prodded Lane into his leadership role as an advisor of the students.

"I thought we elected to represent us, and if you're going to, I want to know," Clark said he asked during a forum.

A petition currently circulating through the student body requesting that A&M President Dr. Ray M. Bowen re-evaluate the parameters he set for the 2002, including re-imposing a "cut."

Clark said he believes Lane is not representing the students because Clark said Lane refused to consider taking a petition from Bowen, even if a majority of students signed it.

"They asked him if, in the event all of the students signed the petition, would he take it to the administration and represent the students, and he said no," Clark said.

Lane rebutted KTFB's claim that he refused to advocate for students to the administration through his office.

"I never, ever said I would take that to the administration," Lane said. "I do not always agree with everything, but that does not mean I won't take opinion from Bowen's office."

Lane and the Student Senate publicly denounced KTFB's plan for an off-campus bonfire this semester.

Lane said students should dwell on Bowen's parameters and prepare for Bonfire 2002.

"Everyone needs to understand that Bowen did not make up these parameters," Lane said. "He had to buy into the people who put him in the job. I know a lot of students who think it could be different, but it is time to move forward."

Lane said students have expressed their concern about Bowen's parameters about being canceled during the semester.

"That input has been taken into consideration over the past few months," Lane said. "I do believe Bowen's parameters can be changed."

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
