Bonfire scholars named

Twelve Texas A&M students were awarded the 1999 Bonfire Memorial Scholarship, which includes a \$2,500 stipend per year. The scholarships were established as a memorial to the 12 Aggies who died in the 1999 Aggie Bonfire collapse.

A \$2,500 scholarship also has been established to honor the 27 students injured in the collapse.

The first recipient of the scholarship, John Comstock, is one of the students injured in the collapse. He is ex-

pected to return to school in Spring 2001. Of the 12 students awarded, five are relatives of the memorialized students and seven are friends of the deceased.

Scholarship recipients must be a relative, graduate of the same high school or resident of the same hometown as one of the memorialized students, Bowen said.

The scholarships are funded by individual donors and through gifts received for the Bonfire Memorial Fund established by the Texas A&M Foundation.

them before the administration — regardless of his opinion on the matter or the number of signatures.

"It doesn't matter if it's two people on the signature or 40,000, I would take it to [Bowen]," Lane said. "I do not always agree with all the views that are out there. But that's OK — it's an important part of the process."

However, concerning an off-campus bonfire, Lane said he did not see enough concern from students to advocate KTFB's position this semester; he said he could not address KTFB's concerns when he felt so

many students were adamantly opposed to an off-campus bonfire. Student senators did a constituency study, which reflected a negative opinion of an off-campus bonfire among students. Regardless, he said, KTFB has not actively tried to work with student government to reach a compromise.

"I have not been taken up on that offer," Lane said. "KTFB's opinion is important. It has helped shape a lot of things and their intentions are good."

Lane said the urgency lies not in battling over Bowen's parameters, but rather in planning for Bonfire 2002.

"Some of our efforts to see students on Bonfire 2002 overshadowed with discounting the Bowen parameters," Lane said. "I think we have demotivated ourselves by not preparing to offer them concerning the design of Bonfire. He said the planning committee will make decisions on Bowen's parameters."

Lane said he would have to see Bonfire 2000 happen, said he understood that it was feasible.

Lane said the closed-mindedness of some students is standing in the way of progress. "I think we have demotivated ourselves by not preparing to offer them concerning the design of Bonfire. He said the planning committee will make decisions on Bowen's parameters."

Lane said that those opportunities in working with the Bonfire planning committees to design and implement changes for the new fire. He said no formal decision has occurred yet, and most committees have not had their meetings yet.

"It is a big misconception that students think we have already made decisions regarding Bonfire 2002," Lane said. "We have, in fact, the process has just begun. Now we need to concentrate on making [Bonfire] 2002 work at the beginning of the process."

Lane said the classes of '01 and '03 graduate, the Class will carry on the new Bonfire. "I think so many of the fresh students want very badly to participate in Bonfire," Lane said.

"Sometimes I think we are concentrating too much on the move forward for them. I think are the ones who are going this," he said, referring to the continuation of Aggie traditions.

Lane said the planning committee is ready to work with all students including KTFB — to establish a new Bonfire suitable for everyone. "I invite them to come out on one of these meetings," Lane said. "The last thing that the committee wants to do is come up with a design structure and have it not be the right concept for the student body."

KTFB board members Dyson and Will Clark questioned the appointment of committee members and the decision-making powers given to them. Lane said students on the committee were chosen from student leaders who were already elected to represent student views. The planning committee includes all facets of student leadership, faculty members and administrators.

"A lot of times, we put ourselves in a position where we are not a dynamic group," Lane said. "The steering committee, we have to see things from all angles. We have to see those who don't want to see many changes to Bonfire to those who are real radical in their views."

Lane said there should be an agreement with the committee's position — it can take input from students and come up with anything, as long as it meets Bowen's requirements.

"This is the beginning of the process, and it starts today," Lane

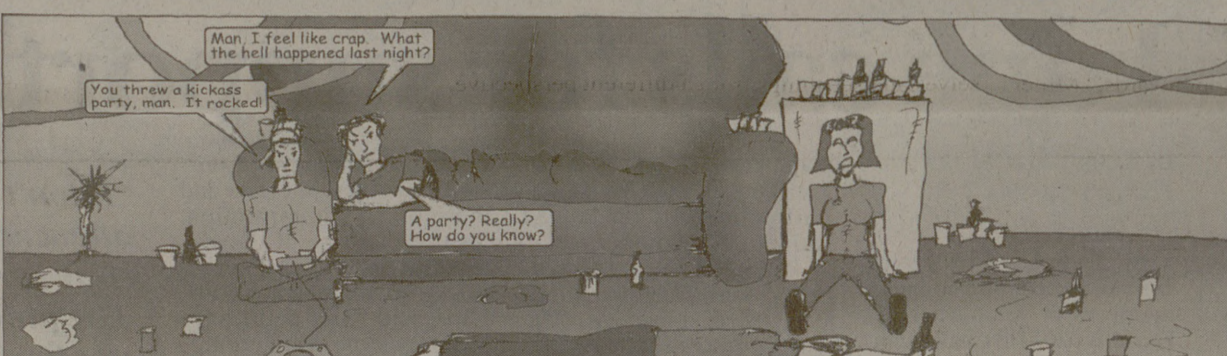

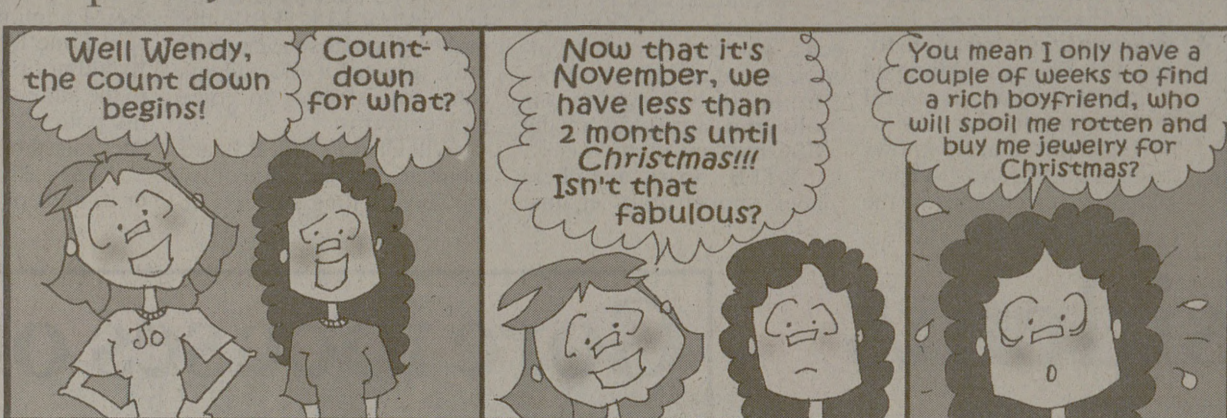
