



Baker served as secretary of state from January 1989 to August 1992. During this time and as the United States entered the post-Cold War era, Baker traveled to more than 90 foreign countries, brokered major deals on reducing conventional and strategic arms, provided U.S. support for Germany's reunification and convened a Middle East peace

conference that has been the foundation of modern peace efforts. A Houston native, Baker graduated from Princeton University in 1952, served two years in the United States Marine Corps and received his juris doctor with honors from the University of Texas-Austin School of Law in 1957. Baker has served in senior government positions under three U.S. presidents and led presidential campaigns for five consecutive presidential elections from 1976 to 1992.

Presently, he is a senior partner in the law firm of Baker Botts and senior counselor to the Carlyle Group, a merchant banking firm in Washington, D.C. "I am not being romantic about this, my friends; we do have corruption in American government," Baker said. "We did throughout our history, and we are going to have it tomorrow and the next day and the next year. What I am suggesting, however, is that we are really better off than we sometimes think."

Suspected rabid kitten sold at Post Oak Mall

The family who bought a kitten suspected of having rabies at Post Oak Pets in Post Oak last month is being urged to contact the Brazos County Shelter at 361-0675 immediately.

The kitten was one of three sold at the pet store. The other two kittens have been recovered. Results Tuesday showed the kitten was rabid.

Any residents who handled or purchased any animal at Post Oak Pets since Oct. 15 should contact the animal shelter. The families who received the three kittens will receive rabies shots.

The kittens' previous owner, who lives in Hilltop Lakes, said the kittens were sprayed with skunk before they were sold at Post Oak Pets, said store manager Bennie Jacobs. Jacobs said the pet store three weeks ago.

He said he was not aware of the kittens had been sprayed when they were purchased.

He said Post Oak Pets nates and keeps records on every animal in the store.

Employees at Post Oak will receive rabies shots because they were in contact with the kittens.

This is the first case of infected with rabies in Brazos County in at least 20 years.

Don Davis Sr., Davis' father, spent about six months in the Brazos County Jail for lying to authorities about giving his fugitive son \$6,000 in cash.

According to The Eagle, Davis was next seen at the Dearborn Police Department on Jan. 11. With no identification and \$100 in a pocket, Davis gave police his name and said he was homeless. Officers did not question his appearance.

He was found guilty of kidnapping and sentenced to three days in jail before he was released. While in custody, police ran Davis' fingerprints through the Michigan database and came up with nothing.

Fifteen months later, A&M students learned of his arrest in October through their fingerprints eventually made their way to the FBI. Davis showed the match.

Davis' case has made headlines on high-profile shows, such as "America's Most Wanted" and "Solved Mysteries."
