"I did not know [Leonard] was alive," Lossner said, wanting to give the ring to A&M University.

Contact was made with President Dr. Ray M. Bowen arranged to bring Lossner to the presentation. It was Lossner learned of Turney Leonard's story.

"I never imagined [the ring] might belong to a famous Lossner said.

Douglas Leonard accepted the ring and then presented it along with Turney W. Leonard Medal of Honor, to Bowen permanent display at the Sanders of Cadets Center.

"This ring will not leave A&M College," Douglas Leonard said. "This was for a great man fought in the war for what he believed was right and for God."

The return of the ring held importance for other members of W. Leonard's family who do remain were actually reuniting Kathleen Zarr, daughter of Turney Leonard's late sister, said she was accompanying his remains was a great memento, which indicates that his remains may not have been the Turney W. Leonard.

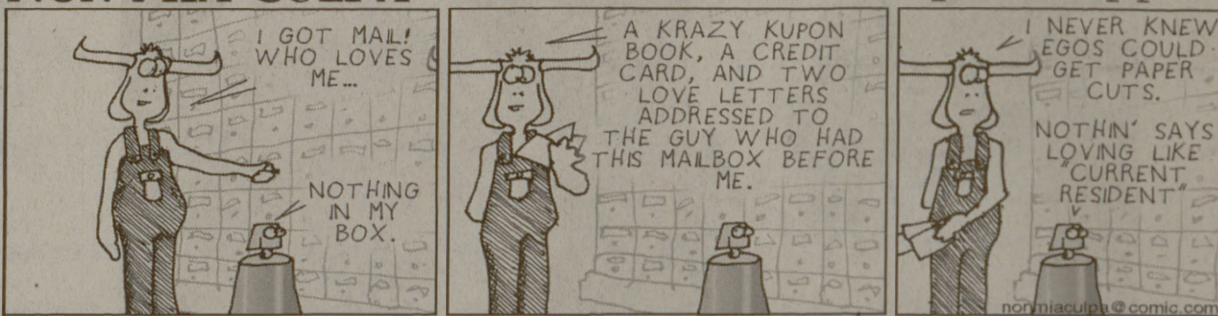
Turney R. Leonard, Turney Leonard's nephew, received news of the ring's return with amazement and pessimism.

"You never know if someone might want \$2 billion for something like this or if it might not be true," Turney Leonard said. "Sure, [the ring] might not be him, but [they] might be him. Fifty-six years later, this proves to us that he really existed."

Lossner also presented a photograph from his command to A&M University's aerial photograph of the Aggie Forces' positions during the battle taken in 1944. He expressed amazement at the outpouring of appreciation from so many people.

"I want to honor the memory of a great son and graduate of this university," Lossner said. "I thought about so many people's lives this much."

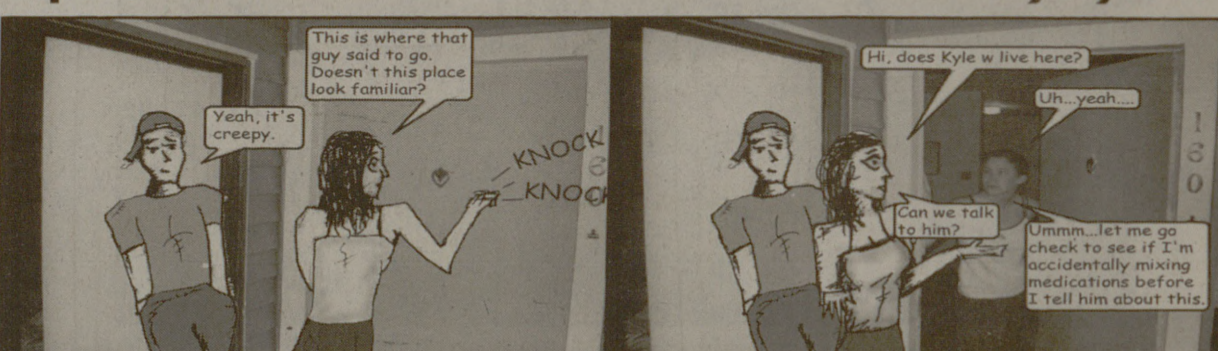

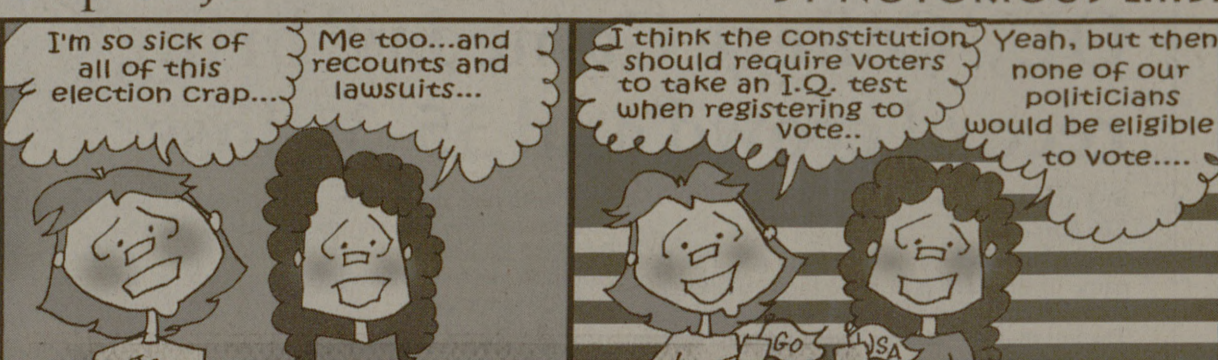

Maroon Out, the Aggies defeated No. 10 Kansas State. This game the Aggies added an extra touch for the No. 1 Sooners by combining Maroon Out with a 12th Man "Towel Out" that added a dizzying touch to the maroon-clad Kyle Field.

In anticipation of the imposing crowd confined in the concrete walls of the stadium, several members of the A&M athletic department measured the volume level of the stadium for the Guinness Book of World Records. The Aggies fell well short of the 128.7 decibel level needed to break the record for the loudest crowd ever to witness an outdoor sporting event.

A&M registered just 113.6 on the sound meter. According to one of the event organizers, Mason Brand, the Aggie crowd would have had to have been five times louder to exceed the mark.

The margin in the game was much closer; just four yards and four points shy of the program's first upset of a No. 1 opponent.

"I don't hold the soldiers there responsible," he said. "On a personal level, I don't think I begrudge all of them. Of course, there are a couple of them I think I still would have a problem with."  
Although he separated from the service in October, Gonzales said future military service is not out of

the question. He is currently thinking about pursuing a reserve or national guard career.

For Gonzales, Veteran's Day is a time to reflect on the past and think about the future.

"I don't reflect on the experience so much on Veteran's Day," he said. "My reflection now comes on all the veterans I've been able to work with since I've been back. I think of all their stories and conflicts."

and well — maybe even stronger because sometimes when you go through a very difficult situation, it brings you closer and makes your bonds even stronger."

Despite the closeness of the community and its host community, pastor Richers said the community helped the community understand the Aggie spirit more.

"In a way, it has reminded us that the Aggie spirit is both something to celebrate and to respect, to share in good times, but also to share in heartaches that are shared by people," he said.

Through it all, the Bonfire lapse has been a reminder of how quickly tragedy can strike, and how quickly it can pass.

"I think there is more awareness of how fragile life is and how quickly things can change, and that, as we try, we don't always have control over what happens in our lives and in our community," she said. "What makes us stronger is knowing that we can get through it."
