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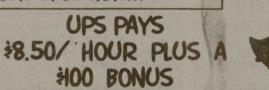

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) - No evidence has been found that New Jersey worked to hide evidence that state Farmer Jr. told the Associated Press troopers searched minority motorists on Sunday. "Did we do enough soon based solely on the color of their skin, the state's attorney general said.

But nearly 100,000 pages of documents being made public Monday show that overwhelmingly disproportionate numbers of minorities were stopped and searched for drugs.

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Labor board examines Seattle Tim Striking employees claim unfair pressure by newspar, strosity Thanks

SEATTLE (AP) — Union representatives met with an investigator from the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) on Monday to press their claim that management of The Seattle Times was unfairly pres-

suring striking employees. The Northwest Pacific Newspaper Guild accused the Times of telephoning striking workers at home and telling them they could lose their jobs to replacement workers unless they returned to work.

The guild filed a petition last week asking the NLRB

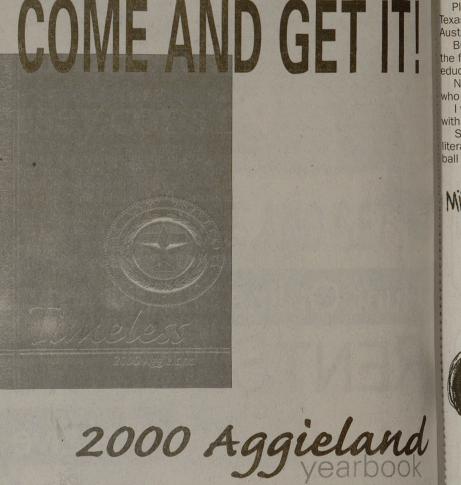
