found that having a "strong or father figure was more positive than having an "overprotective" or "controlling" one.

Approximately 1,000 community college and school students were surveyed. The instrument used in the study is relatively new, called a parental bonding instrument (PBI). This instrument measures the women's responses to their fathers' "overprotective" or "controlling" behavior. Ballard said four variables of the PBI were used to measure the relationship between a father and daughter. They are the "strong father" which the female had consented sexual experience with, the number of pregnancies she has had, whether she was sexually abused, and the number of times she was sexually abused.

"The most astounding was that, of those women being sexually abused, the number of crises resulting from the abuse throughout their lives, standing," Ballard said.

The team of researchers that 37 percent (356 women surveyed) were sexually abused as children. Of the women, 65 percent had been sexually abused more than once and 10 percent reported being abused more than five times. Ballard and her team of researchers were able to find such correlations.

"We found that of those women that were sexually abused, a prominent number abused their daughters as a result," said Ballard.

The correlation between four variables and the relationship between the daughter and father was substantial.

"The better relationship between a daughter and father, the healthier choices she makes in her life," Ballard said.

"When we saw all the negative side effects from a poor father/daughter relationship, it just confirmed the theory that fathers need to be present in their daughters' lives if they're not living at home," Ballard said.

Ballard said this study is unique compared to other research programs because PBI had never been used before these specific variables.

The study also examined the effect that mothers have on daughters, but this information has yet to be released. The study of a bad parental relationship was not studied in the project.
