





a space. However, the necessity of overflow housing in the past has led potential residents to off-campus apartments with comparable amenities and a similar environment, Cowley said.

"Many students would prefer to live on campus," she said. "But if the [housing] assignments they receive are far from what they want or if there is not enough room, their parents want them in the same type of place, with a roommate and cafe-

When students are assigned to housing they think is unacceptable, Cowley said, they look to a place that gives them close to what they had at home with their parents.

In the housing assignments office, students are served on a firstcome, first-serve basis. Upperclassmen have first choice on the modular-style halls.

Freshmen are assigned to residence halls in the summer, and a computer-based program places remaining students in the next housing prince range by a priority date. As a result, more than 80 percent of people vie for 30 percent of the room space in the modular halls, Thomas said.

If students have a roommate preference, their housing preference is forfeited and their priority date is reset to match their roommates' date for assignment, Thomas said.

Students who have their own room at home and want to keep the same amenities come to off-campus communities like Callaway House, said Callaway House assistant general manager Marc Wade. Callaway has an in-house cafeteria and roommates are hand-picked on the basis of their responses on preference

"[Residents] want it like Mom made it at home," said Ronda Cook, a Callaway community assistant and junior management major. "Parents want to feel like their students will be taken care of, and that's what we look to do.

Callaway has community pro-

grams similar to on-campus residence hall council programs. On her tours, Cook emphasizes the convenience of having everything located in one building. Students are across the street from campus and can do their laundry, check their mail, eat in a cafeteria and take advantage of study rooms in one place.

Rates, which include a meal plan and can be as high as \$13,000 a year for a one-bedroom suite and as low as \$6,200 for a shared bedroom in a four-person apartment, are more daunting than they seem, Cook said.

"If you lump all of your living expenses into one yearly bill, then it will seem overwhelming," Cook said. "But it's a convenience here everything is taken care of.'

Unlike the off-campus living communities, Residence Life is not in business to make a profit. Its rent prices reflect only the expenses it pays to keep the halls open. For the 1999-2000 academic year, rent' for double occupancy in a modular-style hall is \$3,420, which includes phone and utilities. In addition, residents are provided with Campus Calend Monday
