Tennis advances to NCAA Elite Eight

The No. 7 Texas A&M men's tennis team completed their most successful campaign in the program's history by advancing to the Elite Eight in the NCAA Team Championships in Athens, Ga. After defending their home court in regionals, the Aggies defeated LSU in the round of 16 before losing to

The Aggies entered the tournament as the fourth seed and quickly jumped out to lead over the 13th-seeded Tigers with wins in No. 2 and 3 doubles.

Big 12 newcomer of the year Tres Davis and sophomore Ryan Newport outlasted the LSU tandem of Anthony Mateljan and Ajay Ramaswami at No. 2, while Cody Hubbell and Jarin Skube cruised to an 8-3 win over LSU's Sanjin Sadovich and Jesse Smatt at

Davis also won his match at No. 6 singles, sweeping past John Gray-Pou, 6-4, 6-2. Hubbell dispatched Sadovich, 6-0, 6-2 to clinch the Aggies' 4-1 victory.

"I thought Cody did a good job jumping on his guy early," said A&M head coach Tim Cass after the match. "He and Tres really helped our momentum with their starts.

Madden was also defeated in the second round of singles competition by LSU's Ramaswami, 6-2, 6-4.


