Doctors making do in flood aftermath

MULLENS, W.Va. (AP) — To treat patients, Sam Muscari Sr. and Manuel Barit rely on their memories — among the only things left intact in this flood-ravaged coalfield town. The doctors' downtown offices were destroyed by July's record floods. Hundreds of records detailing medical histories are now a mud-caked, useless mess. Also gone are X-ray machines, computers and equipment the doctors once used to diagnose ailments and prescribe treatments. The doctors have set up makeshift quarters in trailers so they can serve the community of about 2,000 people. They have practiced in the town for a combined 60 years. Even under trying conditions, residents say the comfort of reliable care from an old friend is an immeasurable help. "People are trying to help each other," said patient Michele Burleson. "That's all you have right now." The doctors' practices were among the 60 businesses wiped out July 8 when severe thunderstorms dumped up to 10 inches of rain in the county. Runoff from a creek and the nearby Guyandotte River filled their offices with nearly seven feet of water. Muscari used to carry flood insurance, but he canceled it in the 1980s because water had never even risen to his door. But there was more than money to consider once the water drained away. Muscari and Barit faced a dual set of problems — starting over themselves and helping hundreds of patients rebuild and recover from their own physical and emotional wounds. Barit's solution for now is a white trailer just outside of town, donated by public health officials. Muscari's settled close to his old office in a doublewide trailer on lease. Patients like Burleson do not mind the temporary settings. They say the doctors' work — sometimes at no charge — means a lot to people facing heavy burdens. "A lot of people, they would have still took advantage," Burleson said, adding that Muscari "didn't make us pay for anything." Despite the water-soaked conditions, both doctors they have seen no outbreak of flood-related diseases. Barit mostly treated patients for cuts and scrapes caused by cleanup efforts, along with a few rashes. Muscari has given a hundred precautionary shots. He also is starting to more stress-related ailments, prompting him to act as a counselor. "I know my people, and I'm able to sit and talk and just make common sense out of it," Muscari said. "That's about all you can do." For the doctors, getting to work has been excellent personal therapy. Barit said himself in their jobs talking out problems with patients reminds them that can only get better. "We all laugh and joke about things that happened," Muscari said. "Why cry?" They have also started planning for rebuilding. Barit said will likely refurbish his washed-out office. Muscari's old office has been condemned, but he bought an adjacent building. Both hope to be back in business before winter. In the meantime, both say the disaster should bring a tighter community even closer. "We're all in it together, and we'll all work out of it together," Muscari said.

News in Brief

Second Florida resident treated for West Nile virus
MADISON, Fla. (AP) — A woman in north Florida is being treated for encephalitis caused by the West Nile virus, the second human case of the disease this year, the state Department of Health said Saturday. The name of the 64-year-old patient and her condition were not released.

Another Madison County resident died by the West Nile virus was hospitalized last month. Seymore Carruthers, 73, was in fair condition Friday. Health officials have placed 28 north Florida counties under an alert for West Nile and Eastern equine encephalitis, which is transmitted by mosquitoes. West Nile causes only a flu-like sickness in some people but can be life-threatening in the elderly.

The return of Rocky Bernard for a fifth season also will be a boost to the defense. A consistent performance from Evan Perroni may just be all the Aggies need this year, if Bernard has recovered and Warren continues to improve. On the defense, Aggie junior inside linebacker Brian Gamble could be a decent quarterback. Outside linebackers Jerrod Penright and Christian Rodriguez must step up to fill the shoes of the departed Jason Glenn and Roylin Bradley for the defense to remain solid. An enduring memory of the Aggie secondary from last season is Texas' shredding of it by Chris Simms during the 43-17 defeat in Austin last year, which does not sit well with this group.

"We made Chris Simms into what he is," said safety Jay Brooks at Big 12 media days two weeks ago. Now they are seeking some form of redemption, which may not be as difficult as some believe. Junior cornerback Sammy Davis is a pre-season All-American pick, and Brooks has filled the role of the departed Michael Jameson. All-Big 12 selection Terrence Kiel and redshirt sophomore Sean Weston complete a young and rather experienced secondary. The A&M schedule for this season is not easy. Road games at Oklahoma and Kansas State, along with home games with Notre Dame and Texas, do not make for an easy season. If the team continues to mature and improve and if a few highly-touted freshmen are up to the challenge, the Aggies may just be a surprise to many who have predicted their demise.
