Bryan seeks new city manager, purchases La Salle

The recent \$1.2 million purchase of the near bankrupt La Salle Hotel, an ongoing plan to revitalize the downtown area of Bryan and finding a new city manager to replace Mike Conduff are a few items on the agenda the City of Bryan will be addressing during the next couple of months.

Hugh Walker, interim city manager for Bryan, has filled the position since Conduff departed five months ago for the same position in Denton. Bryan is now looking to fill the city manager position as soon as

A pool of 12-15 applicants was narrowed down to just six people following interviews conducted on Friday and Saturday this past weekend. Walker said the candidates come from mostly midwestern states and have had some city managerial experience. It is unknown when a final decision will be announced.

"[The city] has budgeted to

rently operated," Walker said, "It has been budgeted in such a way that we will be able to take care of the La Salle Hotel, as well as continue city operations as normal."

The purchase of the La Salle Hotel is part of a downtown revitalization project that has been in the works for more than a year by the city of Bryan. A consultant firm, Looney Ricks Kiss, was hired to investigate public perception of downtown Bryan and College Staiton.

One item of interest to students at Texas A&M is the possibility of a rail transit link between downtown Bryan and College Station. The rail transit link would bring students from Northgate and visitors from the George Bush Presidential Library Complex to the downtown Bryan area.

"[The rail link] is not absolutely vital to the revitalization," Walker said. "There is a great potential in College Station that has really been untapped for [the City of Bryan]




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
