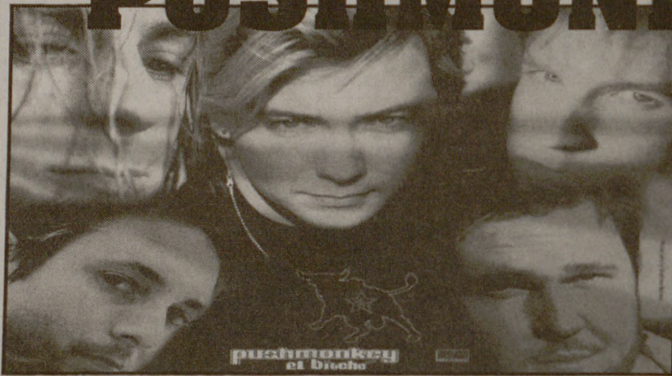

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Greek organization this fall. Though she alleged race may have been behind her rejection last year, she told the campus newspaper, *The Crimson White*, that the Greek system at Alabama is not all bad.

"It's elitist and it's somewhat racist, but I still believe that that racism is more from the women that are not even in the sorority," she said. "I honestly think that most of that close-mindedness comes from alums."

Twilley attended the prestigious Alabama School for Mathematics and Science. She

came to Alabama driving a new sport-utility vehicle that was a gift from her father.

"If someone with the qualities of Melody Twilley can't get into a sorority, we have some substantial problems in our Greek system," said Norm Baldwin, president of the Faculty Senate, which has pushed for integration.

"It's a very sad day for the Greek system and the University of Alabama," Baldwin said Monday. "It reinforces a lot of negative stereotypes that people would like to go away."

Of 731 women who participated in sorority "rush," about 625 received membership invitations.

Administrators and faculty leaders have pushed for integration of the school's Greek system, which for decades has been a seedbed for state leaders, including the current governor, Don Siegelman.

School officials have kept a close watch on the issue since then-Gov. George C. Wallace made a celebrated "stand in schoolhouse door" in 1963, an attempt to keep two black students from enrolling in the all-white university.

President Andrew Sorenson has said he would not mandate integration or institute a quota system, but another administrator said officials would continue working on an end to segregation.

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from most likely (the Memorial Student Center) to least likely (Northside) to evoke a "howdy." Time of day made no difference, according to Patel, who said the student response rate was disappointing.

"Generally, people aren't accustomed to the 'howdy' response, so they don't respond," she said. "It's important for students to realize that it's up to them to [revive] a tradition that's dying."

One group of Aggies is trying to do just that. Howdy Ags, a student organization founded to ensure "howdy's" presence on A&M's campus, just may be the dwindling tradition's saving grace.

Jayne Wittie, a member of Howdy Ags and a junior biomedical science major, said the organization participates in events such as Howdy Week by getting local businesses involved, giving away prizes to those who exchange howdies and forming a "Howdy line" (wearing t-shirts that spell out — you guessed it — "Howdy"). Yet Wittie said the club works all year long to promote the tradition.

"One of the biggest problems is that students are busy with their own lives and so into their own schedules that they don't even think about it," Wittie said.

"People are not used to an everyday tradition. They have to go to a football game or yell practice — some scheduled event — involved with any kind of school spirit. We claim to be the friendliest campus, so it's sad that 'howdy' has declined. Our organization does its best to get students back in the tradition, but in the end, it's all up to them."
